FARMERS' INSTITUTE MEETING

As previously announced in Lake County papers, there will be a meeting of the Lake County Farmers' Institute at Lake Forest, August 2, at 2 P. M. The principal speakers at this meeting will be Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, Mr. Carl Vrooman; an officer of the British or French Armies stationed in this country and also some other speaker of state and national prominence along agricultural lines. Good music will be furnished.

Farmers and business men of Lake County could hardly spend a half day's time more profitably than by attending this, one of the most important agricultural meetings to be held in Lake County this year. It is very seldom that we can get speakers of such national prominence. Watch for complete program in next week's issue. Posters announcing the speakers and principal points of interest will be distributed in Lake County within a few days. Watch for these announcements.

FIELD MEETING

Over 20 farmers visited the E. B. Jordan Farm, Deerfield, a few days ago for the purpose of seeing Mr. Jordan's clover and wheat fields. Mr. Jordan has the heaviest crop of clover found this season in Lake County. It has been estimated that this clover will make in the neighborhood of four tons of cured hay per acre.

This 11 acres of clover was seeded in 1917 with wheat and barley as nurse crops. The wheat made 32 bushels per acre and the barley about 35 bushels per acre. About 10 lbs. of seed per acre were used. The type of soil is brown silt loam.

As mammoth clover lives from two to three years, Mr. Jordan is planning to turn under his next crop for green manure. The Ontario Agricultural College found that of all crops tested, sweet clover gave in the neighborhood of 30 tons of green manure per acre, while mammoth clover was second, making about 18 tons per acre. Even a two ton crop of clover used as green manure would enrich the soil at the rate of 98% of nitrogen, 83% of potassium and 25% of phosphorus. Such a crop is almost equivalent to 10 tons of barnyard manure applied per acre.

For feeding purposes there is but little difference between mammoth and red clover. Because of its extremely rank growth, mammoth clover should be pastured in early spring or should be seeded with millet or some other crop that would aid in curing. Mr. Jordan has been compelled to let this clover lie on the ground for several days before it was cured enough to go into the barn. The use of the tedder and side-delivery rake are especially recommended when mammoth clover is grown.

classical selections. The highest class of standard classics is used in concert work.

Only those are admitted as players in this organization who have taken a thorough course of study and training and qualified for it.

It takes a lot of hard, pains-taking work on the part of both pupil and instructor to make a high-class player, capable of appearing in concert work.

The growth and development of Zion Orchestra has been steady. The instrumentation is as follows: Seven first violins; five second violins; one viola; two cellos; one bass; one flute; first and second oboes; first and second clarinets; first and second bassoons; first and second cornets; first and second horns; one trombone; drums, orchestra bells and traps; piano and harp.

The goal aimed at in the development of this organization is to build up eventually a symphony orchestra, which is the highest attainment of orchestral work.

Serving as a feeder for Zion Orchestra is a lesser organization known as the Junior Orchestra, consisting just now of twenty members. It contains some excellent talent, and a lot of good material is coming on, giving promise for the future.

Of invaluable aid in building up, not only Zion Orchestra but all Zion's musical organizations, is the Department of Music where instruction is given absolutely free to hundreds of pupils. Conductor L. J. Hire of Zion Orchestra is the head of the Violin Department in this department of the school work. Therefore, pupils taking this class of instruction with a view to entering the orchestra are under his direction straight through from the beginning.

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When we think of these highly efficient organizations, all of which were of inestimable assistance during the Feast of Tabernacles just closed, let us thank God for the faithful work and for the beautiful spirit shown.
