

LOCAL ITEMS

(C. B. W.)

At the Early Morning Service, in Shiloh Tabernacle, on Lord's Day, a week ago, Mr. Patrick McIntosh requested Apostle Harwood, who was conducting the service, to pray that his brother-in-law and others in Saskatchewan, Canada, might sell their property, consisting of several hundred acres of farm land, and be able to move to Zion. In fact, there are only three or four small places in the county which have a lower rate of taxation than the City of Zion.

INCOME TAX

All Income Tax reports must be turned in on or before March 15th.

All unmarried persons with an income of \$1,000 per year or more (the report must cover the year 1918) must make a report.

All married persons with an income of \$2,000 a year or more must make a report.

Where other members of the family earn money and it all goes into a common fund a report must be made.

Let every one within Zion's ranks attend at once and strictly to this matter. Do not run any risk of making a mistake, but call at the Administration Building and see Deacon O. W. Farley. Do it at once! Do not take the benefit of any doubts yourself, but resolve all doubts in favor of the Government until you know better.

The fact that you may be entitled to certain exemptions does not relieve you of the necessity of filing your report.

This notice ought to be sufficient to put all persons strictly on their guard in this matter and make it impossible for any one to fail in responding in strict accordance with the law.
