MINISTER ARRIVES IN ZION

Rev. Solomon Moses Duyzers and wife arrived in Zion on last Saturday from Wiseton, Saskatchewan, Canada, with the intention of making this their permanent home.

Rev. Duyzers became interested in Zion several months ago through reading *Leaves of Healing* and other Zion literature, sent to him by Mr. Patrick McIntosh, of Zion Home, who himself moved to Zion, with his family, a year or so ago, after having been converted through reading the *Leaves of Healing*.

After reading the *Leaves of Healing* and Apostle Jordan's book, "The Present Great World Crisis," he began preaching Divine Healing and the Second Coming of Christ, and from that time suffered untold persecution. Only one member of his congregation stood with him; the others tried to drive him out, but he refused to go, and on different occasions it became necessary for him to have the Canadian mounted police stand guard over him while he preached. He felt that God had entrusted him with a message, that he was preaching with Divine authority, and he did not care what any man said or thought.

At one time he was to have held a prayer meeting at a schoolhouse in the country, but just at the last moment he was called elsewhere to pray for a sick child and was unable to attend the service. The child was healed. Later, he learned that a gang went there with five gallons of whisky, declaring their intention of breaking up the meeting and starting a mob. The ruffians got into a fight among themselves and cut and pounded each other up.

Columns more could be related of all that he and his wife passed through, but in all probability their story will appear in *Leaves of Healing* at some later date. He says that he has come into Zion, willing to work anywhere that he is placed, and that if necessary he will put on overalls and work with a pick and shovel.
