### EXTRA SESSION OF THE SENATE

WASHINGTON, March 6.—SENATE.—Mr. Wallace moved that the credentials of Mr. Lamar be taken from the table and he be sworn as senator from Mississippi.

Mr. Anthony moved that the senate adjourn—referred, 35 to 15.

Mr. Blaine said Mr. Lamar's credentials were entirely regular and he was as much entitled to be sworn as himself or any other senator sworn yesterday.

A long debate ensued and Mr. Spencer directed Bourwell's committee's report last session on Mississippi affairs read, but the senate refused.

Mr. Blaine argued that the report might show that the legislature which elected Mr. Lamar was illegal, but that was a matter for subsequent inquiry. It was a dangerous thing to stop a senator from taking the oath who bore the proper credentials.

Mr. Thurman said there was nothing in Mr. Bourwell's report affecting Mr. Lamar's prima facie right to a seat, not one word in the report which touched this question, and it was out of order for the senate to listen to the reading of the report.

Mr. Morton begged to remind the senate that one year ago Mr. Thurman stood on the other side of this prima facie business in the case of Pinchback. According to Mr. Thurman there could be no investigation directly to the legislature which elected Mr. Lamar, but there could be as to which elected Pinchback. He (Morton) held the same doctrine now as he did in the Pinchback case.

but there had been a sudden revolution on the part of the Democrats, he believed the senators elected in 1876, he called in the regular order in which they are named. Kellogg was here with a legal certificate, but objection was made to swearing him in yesterday on the very ground upon which he was sworn from taking his seat to-day.

Mr. Spencer had a right to interpose objection to the case of Mr. Lamar. It seemed to him, Morton, that this was an attempt to have one doctrine in one case and another doctrine in another case.

The motion to refer the credentials of Senator Lamar to the committee on privileges and elections was rejected—yeas 1, nays 58.

Mr. Davis advocated receiving Mr. Lamar.

Mr. Spencer opposed, because the legislature electing him was a fraud—but he read as part of his remarks a part of Bourwell's report.

Mr. Haullin, from the committee to notify the president that the senate was organized, reported that the president would communicate to-morrow regarding executive business.

#### WASHINGTON GOSSIP.

New Arrangements for West Point.—The Returning Board Members call on their toes.

WASHINGTON, March 6.—The Military Academy and post of West Point has been constituted a separate military department and the commandant will report directly to the general in chief of the army who, under the war department, shall have supervision and charge of the academy. He will watch over its administration and discipline and the instruction of cadets and will make reports thereof to the general in chief. By order of the president, Major General Seelye is appointed commander of the new military department and will make his reports direct to the adjutant general, the same as division commanders. In matters of instruction and financial administration he will address the secretary of war through the adjutant general.

President Hayes received a great number of people at the executive mansion to-day including Wells and Anderson of the Louisiana returning board and delegates from the different states. The most prominent was a floral circle was presented to the president and was placed on a pedestal in the centre of the room.

There was a desultory interchange of views about action on the Mississippi and Louisiana contests but nothing decided.

The president has received a letter from Senator Davis, of Illinois, resigning from the senate.

William K. Rogers, private secretary to President Hayes, took possession of his office this morning.

Consultation between the president and a few friends as to the formation of the cabinet had not, up to 1 o'clock, resulted in any conclusion. Information at the executive mansion is that Wm. M. Evans has been designated for secretary of state and Senator Sherman for secretary of the treasury. Beyond these nothing is absolutely certain.

About noon members of the old cabinet appeared, this being the usual day of mourning, and a regular session was held. All the members were present, including Sec'y Morrill, who was cordially greeted by President Hayes.

#### HAYES'S MEDICINE TWADDE

It is made up of Common Place Ingredients which Look Both Ways.

NEW YORK, March 6.—The World says of the inaugural: "The tone throughout is that of a sermon or of the political summary in a monthly magazine, rather than the statesmanlike expression of political principles and purposes. In regard to the question of policy to be pursued towards the southern states not one word is said which cannot be twisted as easily to countenance the actions of President Grant towards Louisiana two years ago as to endorse the words of President Grant about Louisiana two days ago."

#### THE FIRST PRAND.

He Takes the Oath of Office in Secret and Becomes Grant's Successor.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Last night at 7 o'clock Returning Board Hayes had administered to him the oath of office by Chief Justice Waite. It was done in a very secret manner, and there has since been so much castron lying upon the subject that the town has been fairly upside down over the many conflicting stories that have been circulated upon the subject.

The act of stealing the presidency, fully completed by Hayes's sneaking surreptitiously into office under cover of night, almost unattended, and then enjoining secrecy upon everyone who was connected with this culminating act of the theft makes a most fitting beginning of his fraudulency's official career.

Death of Chief Justice Moses of South Carolina.

COLUMBIA, March 6.—Chief Justice Moses, of the South Carolina supreme court, died at 1 o'clock to-day.

#### A Young Man Killed while Firing for a Friend.

GALESBURG, March 6.—About 5 P. M. yesterday, while firing a salute at Altona, Ill., in honor of the inauguration of President Hayes, the cannon exploded, terribly mangled Charles Barnison, aged 16, who was loading the cannon at the time. Two pieces of the cannon entered Barnison's bowels and both hands were taken off. He died at 9 P. M.

#### Weather Probabilities.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—The Signal Service observations taken at 10 o'clock this forenoon indicate the following weather probabilities for this afternoon and to-night:

Indications for the northwest: Falling barometer; variable and cloudy weather; cloudy and light rain or snow, followed by rising barometer, colder, brisk or high northerly winds.

CLEVELAND, March 6.—Leonard's Opera House was totally and Robbins's Block partly destroyed by fire early this morning at Fostoria, Ohio. Loss on Opera House \$10,000, insured \$7,000; loss on block \$5,000, insured \$3,000.

The Crazy Man Who Assaulted Packard.

PHILADELPHIA, March 6.—Wm. Henry Wetton, who attempted the life of Gov. Packard at New Orleans, arrived here yesterday accompanied by his father. He is at large on \$5,000 bail, but it is intimated that he will not be prosecuted, owing to the interposition of friends of his father.

Jo Coburn goes to State Prison for Ten Years.

NEW YORK, March 6.—Joe Coburn, pugilist, is convicted of shooting with intent to kill a policeman, and has been sentenced to ten years in the state's prison.
