MILLIONAIRE CARNEGIE EXPLAINS THE BRITISH POLITICAL SITUATION.

POSTOFFICE DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE POSTMASTER GENERAL, WASHINGTON, D. C., April 29, 1885.

Dear Sir—Yours of the 7th is received. The postal regulations provide that hotels, hospitals and other public institutions, to the care of which letters are addressed to others, shall, after holding them not more than ten days, take them to the postoffice for return to the office.

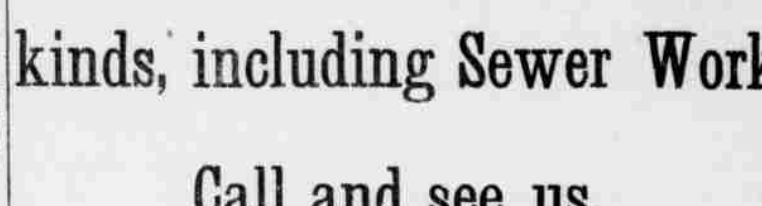
