**THE NATIONAL HUB.**  
**NOTES OF INTEREST PICKED UP IN  
WASHINGTON CITY.**

**Gossip About Official Appointments.—The  
Mormons—A Pretty Romance—Logan  
and the Military Committee—Not  
for Ah Sin—Flashes.**  
WASHINGTON CITY, Sept. 15.—The im-  
pression prevails that the present week will  
see changes in various important offices,  
and that the settlement of the Chicago in-  
ternational revenue collectorship will be  
accomplished by similar disposition of the col-  
lectorships in New York city, concerning which  
the struggle has been quite as fiercely  
waged and protracted as that of Chicago. Only  
three internal revenue collectorships re-  
main to be filled by Democratic in-  
crements, among them several in the interior of  
New York, and Pennsylvania. There is  
quite a probability of Mr. Worthington,  
proprietor of the Boston Traveller, who is  
the Republican incumbent of the collector-  
ship at Boston, being appointed to that city,  
and Massachusetts Democrats are becom-  
ing very impatient over the delay,  
which some of the leaders  
are disposed to hold Secretary Endicott  
responsible. It is stated at the White  
House, however, that Secretary Endicott  
has not interfered in this matter, Assistant  
Secretary Foster, of the state depart-  
ment, has been busily engaged making up a  
list of about 100 consular appointments,  
with the view of suggesting to the president  
his postal best appointments. An-  
nouncements of these appointments are ex-  
pected shortly.

**Justice Powers, of Michigan, the new chief  
justice of Utah, in the city, having been  
called by the president to talk over Mor-  
mon matters.** Powers says that Mr.  
Cleveland is determined to remove Logan  
as possible against the Mormons,  
and has instructed the judicial  
officers to carry out the law to the fullest  
and most rigorous extent. He was pleased  
to hear from Justice Powers that the law  
is working well, and that polygamy is  
greatly feared. A large number of leading  
Mormons are now under indictment,  
among them being John Taylor and  
George Q. Cannon, the latter being at the  
present time fugitive from justice. Justice  
Powers says that the Mormons generally  
are rapidly recognizing the fact that the  
government is determined to have no  
patronage in its hands, and that they only  
remain because they are under the protection  
of the officers of the law.

**When Mr. Brewster left the department  
of justice he asked only one favor of his  
successor, that he retain a certain legal  
clerk. He gave his reasons, and the  
clerk in question is a former member of  
the legislature. The new chief justice is  
a younger man, he said, he was very  
much in love with a girl who refused to  
marry him, presumably because of the dis-  
figurement of his face. She gave no rea-  
son, but he always supposed that was her  
objection to him. She married some one  
else, and he is now a member of the  
bar. The next letter he wrote in-  
vited her to a position in the department of  
justice, which she accepted, and which As-  
sistant General Garfield has assured her she  
will retain as long as she is in authority.**

**Illinois.**  
The Illinois committee on the  
quarantine law, which was organized by  
Senator Logan, has held a meeting at the  
capitol, and discussed the bill. The com-  
mittee is composed of Senators Logan, Hill,  
and Stewart, and of Representative  
Graham. The bill is now in the hands  
of the committee, and it is expected that  
it will be reported in a few days.
