SAVAGE PINKERTON MEN

FIRE ON A CROWD WHEN LEAVING THE CHICAGO STOCK YARDS.

One Man Fatally Wounded—One Hundred and Sixty Pinkerton Men and Forty "Scabs" Locked Up for the Crime—Intense Excitement—Situation at the Yards—Strikers Not Working.

CHICAGO, Oct. 20.—There was bloodshed at the stock yards Tuesday. About 12 o'clock a Lake Shore train of seven cars left Armour & Co's packing house.

Arriving at the stock yards "Y" at Thirty-ninth street, it was found that the track was blocked by a freight train. The train was backed up to the terminals until the freight cars could be moved off the track.

Terence Dealey, a contracting teamster, a prominent and well-known citizen, was leading his horse up the track when he was struck in the abdomen on the left side by a rifle bullet.

The greatest excitement prevailed, and thousands of hands were made against the Pinkerton men.

The facts about the shooting were telegraphed to the city police. Officers from the central station, the army and twenty-second street station boarded the train when it reached Twenty-second street.

Every one of the Pinkerton men—100 in all—and the forty non-union men were placed under arrest. The train stopped at Harrison street and all of the prisoners locked up at the army.

At 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon William Pinkerton came to the army and asked all of his men who had done any shooting to step forward. Four men—Robert J. Barrett, H. J. Loomis, Guy Selvers, and Emmet Shaw—stepped forward.

William A. Pinkerton says he has ample proof that his men did not fire upon the crowd until they had been fired upon.
