WILL NEED A LOT OF OFFICER

To Stop Smuggling Under Such Circumstances as These.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—A peculiar state of affairs exists in Nogales, Ari., which is situated partly in the United States and partly in Mexico. By simply crossing the street persons are upon Mexican soil. Customs officers report to the treasury department that American citizens cross the line in this way, buy clothing on the Mexican side, put it on and wear it over to the United States, thus avoiding the payment of duty. The treasury department has instructed the collector of customs to stop the practice by arresting the offenders for smuggling goods across the border, in case they refuse to pay duty.

ABBREVIATED TELEGRAMS.

Delaney, the noted French painter, is dead, aged 63.

Two French Sisters of Mercy and a Belgian priest were killed during the Chinese anti-foreigner riots.

French scientists charge the Eiffel tower with being the cause of recent destructive storms in the vicinity of Paris.

Charles R. Solomon, secretary of the Cigarmakers' union of Newark, N. J., is missing with \$2,288 of the union's funds.

The will of Herman Raster, late editor of The Staats Zeitung, Chicago, disposes of \$102,000 worth of property, giving it to the widow and children.

Elliott F. Shepard, of the New York Mail and Express, has engaged \$25,000 worth of hotel room at Chicago for use during the World's fair.

It is now believed that the bandits who robbed the Southern Pacific express near Samuels, Tex., secured \$15,000 or more instead of \$2,000 as at first reported.

At Wheeling, W. Va., 9-year-old Edward Gillis teased six English mastiffs until they attacked him and nearly chewed him to pieces. Two of the dogs were shot before he could be released, but he cannot live.

Ex-Congressman Cutcheon was given a farewell reception at his home in Manistee, Mich., regardless of politics. He will move to Washington this week to begin his duties as a member of the board of ordinance.

Nailed upon the hull of the house of a Bridgewater, Eng., builder is the name board of the Confederate cruiser Alabama. It was picked up in the English channel two weeks after the fight with the Kearsarge.

The last Wisconsin legislature enacted measures providing for repayment to the state of interest on state money retained by former state treasurers. Ever since the measure passed efforts have been made to carry it out, but so far no money has been collected.

Because C. T. Westcott opposed the nomination in the Maryland Republican convention of Van Nort, the candidate for governor, the latter gentleman says he will withdraw unless the state committee rescinds its action putting Westcott at the head of the committee.

Six children of a man who got an American divorce from his English wife have been declared illegitimate by English courts. The children were the offspring of marriage to an American woman after the divorce was obtained. This clinches the value of an American divorce in England.

The Tennessee legislature is making poor progress with the business for which it was called—from a labor point of view. The house has adopted a resolution against the releasing of convicts, but has also under discussion a bill to enable the governor to call out the militia to suppress just such outbreaks as the labor riot at Briceville.

Ordered to Recognize the Junta.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—The Evening Post's Washington special says that Minister Egan has been told to recognize the Chilean junta. This is positive, though the state department still preserves its silence.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—Acting Secretary Wharton, of the state department, will neither affirm nor deny the report that Minister Egan has been directed to recognize, in the name of the United States, the new Chilean government.

Black Bear Likely To Be a Good Indian.

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 7.—Late Friday night Black Bear, chief of the Indians on exhibition at Fisk's garden, got full of firewater and whipped his squaw, and the other Indians remonstrated with him, and he started to clean them out. Bear Robe fired three shots at Black Bear, two of them taking effect, and it is thought one of them will probably prove fatal. He will not allow physicians to examine his wounds.

An Ohio Political Item.

TOLEDO, O., Sept. 7.—The chief interest in the Republican county convention which was held in this city Saturday was the contest between Sherman and Foraker for the control of the legislature. Foraker captured one representative, Hon. C. P. Griffin, and Sherman two, Hon. C. A. Flickinger and Mr. O. P. Heller.

Burglars Are Busy in Iowa.

SIoux CITY, Ia., Sept. 7.—Burglars blew open the safe of the Sloan State bank, and secured nearly \$5,000. The Correctionville postoffice was burglarized by the same gang and \$150 worth of stamps taken. The burglars stole horses and escaped.

Chilian Refugees Are Safe.

VALPARAISO, Sept. 7.—The Chilean refugees on board the German and American vessels in this harbor, and in regard to whom the junta would give no guarantees, have been taken to neutral territory and landed.

Many Fields of Corn Frozen.

MILWAUKEE, Sept. 7.—The frost of Saturday morning is reported to have done great damage in the central and northern portions of the state, many fields of corn being frozen.

Suicide of an East St. Louis Man.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 7.—James A. Rodgers, formerly superintendent of police of East St. Louis, committed suicide Saturday with a pistol. Despondency was the cause of the rash act.
