ENTIRE STATE MILITIA CALLED TO RULE IN STREET CAR STRIKE

Indianapolis Will Probably Be Under Martial Law Before Night—Four Already Killed in Riots—Indications Are That Soldiers Will Aid Car Companies—More Bloodshed Expected.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 6.—The entire state militia has been ordered out by Governor Reardon, and it is expected that the city will be under martial law before night because of the local street car strike.

Four men have been killed and a score injured in rioting, due to the company's action in importing two hundred and fifty strikebreakers from Chicago by special train, housing and feeding them at the company's barns and paying them \$4 a day. The strikers demanded \$2.85 a day for nine hours' work.

That the militia has been ordered out for the purpose of breaking the strike would seem to be the purport of the report that attempts will be made to run cars under guard of the troops. Judging by the riots that followed similar attempts with police protection, further bloodshed is possible.

All interests except union labor urged martial law. The business men, who refused to act as deputies because they feared for their personal safety when the police would not guard the cars, were the most persistent in demanding troops, declaring that the tie-up in traffic has cut their trade to a third of normal.
