WASHINGTON, April 22.—At 11:30 o'clock this morning the ceremony that made Mary Leiter the wife of George Nathaniel Curzon was held in St. John's Episcopal church.

Something About the Bride. Miss Mary Leiter is a handsome young woman, whose style of beauty is such that her presence in any social gathering instinctively draws attention to her charms.

Miss Leiter is a good linguist, sings delightfully and plays well, and in going to England to live knows all the good points in her own country, for she has traveled over pretty much all of it—even way up to Alaska.

Curzon a Man with a Name. One thing about Mr. Curzon is that he has a name that he himself has made. His parliamentary reputation added to that he has gained as an authority on Asian politics and other questions of great importance in Great Britain, is of the highest.

MONROE DOCTRINE.

Senator Hill Not a Believer in Late Interpretations.

ITS MEANING MUCH MISCONSTRUED

And Its Author Given a Reputation He Doesn't Deserve and Did Not Desire.—The Much-Quoted Doctrine Never Affirmed by Congress and Its Features Rejected When Put in a Treaty—Some Interesting Remarks.

ALBANY, April 22.—An interview with Senator Hill on the Venezuelan question was given out last night. Senator Hill was asked whether experts in public law think the Monroe doctrine has given to the United States a special right to intervene between Great Britain and Venezuela in the pending boundary dispute, or assumes a protectorate over Spanish-America? He answered that he had never thought so.

Declined to Ratify It in a Treaty. "I think not. Not otherwise certainly than if Chile shall oppress Peru or Mexico shall be unreasonable in dealing with Guatemala. Congress has never affirmed the Monroe doctrine in 1823 President Johnson projected a treaty with Colombia, which was signed, embodying the Monroe doctrine, but neither the Colombian senate, nor our own senate ratified it.

Monroe Not Properly Understood. "Do you think the President Monroe has the reputation of having given his name to a rule or condition by the United States for which neither he nor Adams contended?"

New Feature in the Durrant Case. SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.—The only new thing in the Durrant case is the development of the fact that the police have a shoe found in the study of Rev. J. G. Gibson, pastor of Emanuel church, where Marion Williams and Miss Lamont were murdered. The shoe has blood spots on the sole and is the property of Gibson.

Chicago Anti-Silver Democrats. CHICAGO, April 22.—"The Honest Money League of Illinois" was organized by prominent Democrats of this city at a meeting held in the Palmer House, where it will open permanent headquarters and begin a "campaign of education" to be prosecuted from now until the next presidential election.

Confesses to Save Her Mother. DES MOINES, April 22.—Cora Smith before Judge Spurrier declared she and not her mother, Betsy Smith, murdered Michael Smith, her stepfather. Betsy Smith is serving a life sentence for the crime. The judge set the time for pronouncing judgment. The legislature will be called on to act in the case of Betsy Smith, the governor not having power.
