DEBUQUE TELEGRAPH: It has always been the rule of appellate courts, as affirmed by Justice Harlan in his dissenting opinion, not to declare unconstitutional an act of the legislative branch of the government unless the invalidity of the enactment is clear beyond a reasonable doubt. Yet, though the unconstitutionality of the income tax is extremely doubtful, the United States supreme court yesterday reversed a rule by which it has been governed for more than a century.

MARSHALL FIELD, the great dry goods merchant, was before a committee of the Illinois legislature one recently and told the committee one of the chief agencies which bled him to reach his present leadership in the business world—liberal and honest advertising. The chairman then asked him this direct question: "Do you find that advertising on a large scale in the newspapers helps your business?" which Mr. Field made answer: "do."

JO-I-it's New Advertising Scheme. The city of "Jo-li-it" is getting end of advertising out of the reaction of the common council abolishing by municipal enactment proper pronunciation of the name. For instance, says the New York Sun:

We are favored with an official per of an ordinance declaring the per pronunciation of the word, let, passed April 22, 1895, by city council of Joliet, Illinois. Learn from the preamble to the name that great confusion has arisen over the word, to the annoyance of the citizens; that its etymology has been investigated, and that only correct pronunciation has been determined by the etymological stragglers at Joliet. Then we the first section of the ordinance: 1. That the only official, correct, and pronounced name and spelling of the name of this city shall be Joliet, the accent on the first syllable, with the "o" in such syllable pronounced in its long sound, as in the words "Jo-li-it" and that any other pronunciation used and disseminated as interfering with the uniformity in respect to the proper pronunciation of the name of our city.

he second section of the ordinance provides that the school officers place must enforce such rules all secure the prescribed pronunciation of Jo-li-it at school. The council has undertaken a big job. We do not believe it possesses power to change that pronunciation of the city's name which has become a vogue for several generations. countries there are names of

places which are spoken in ways not justified by their spelling, their etymology, or their history. The place is called after Louis Jolliet, a seventeenth century French Canadian explorer of the Mississippi; and we are sure that M. Jolliet would never have known his own name if it had been spoken by any one in the way in which the council of the city of Joliet has prescribed that it shall be spoken. The true sound and the original spelling of Jolliet's name have both been lost in Joliet; and the people there might as well stick to the thing they have got. We guess they'll stick to it anyhow."
