SPANISH FLEET RUNS FOR HARBOR.

And is Now as Safe as Anything Spanish Can Be at Cadiz.

Madrid, May 11.—A dispatch received here from Havana yesterday afternoon says the Spanish steamer Montserrat, which with a valuable cargo, troops and a large sum of money intended for Havana, escaped the United States fleet and entered the port of Cienfuegos, Cuba, has now run the blockade of the American squadron and has entered the port of Havana in safety.

ORDERED TO MOVE TO TAMPA.

All the Cavalry and Infantry at Chickamauga Get Marching Orders.

Chickamauga National Park, May 11.—Major General Brooke, commanding the United States regular provisional army corps at Chickamauga park, has received orders from the war department directing him to send all the cavalry and infantry troops now in camp Chickamauga park, about 6,000 in all, to Tampa, Fla., without delay.

The order is accompanied with instructions to provide the men with a full supply of ammunition for sixty days.

On receipt of the order General Brooke at once issued an order to the division commanders instructing them to notify the regiment commanders to prepare at once for departure.

One effect of the retreat of the Spanish fleet has been to hasten even more the preparations already under full way for the dispatching of military expeditions to Cuba.

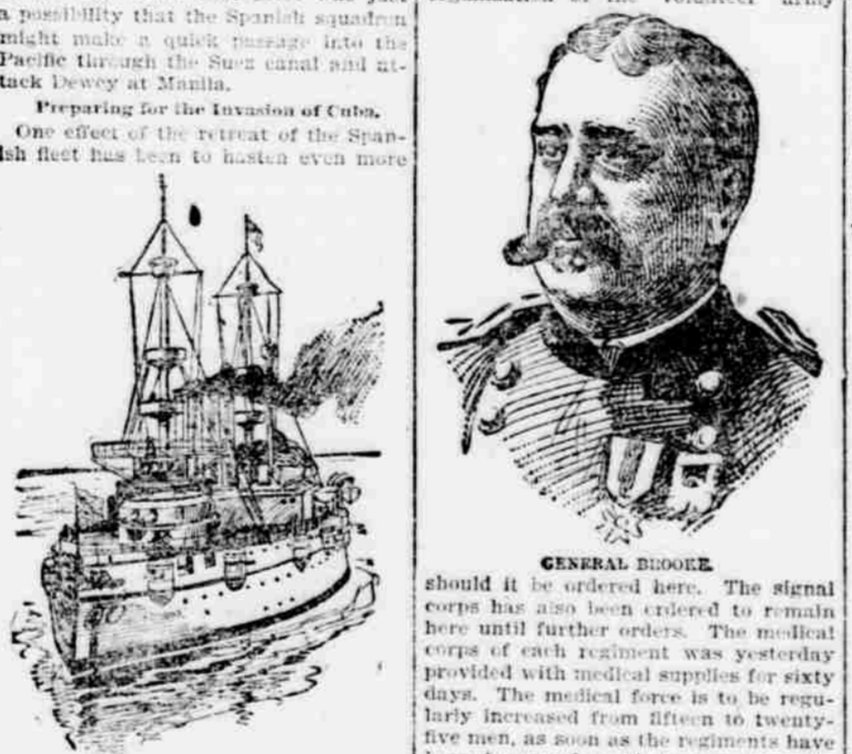
