

Van Ryn and Schauer Settle Grudge Tonight

Hard to Predict Result of Bout, but Both Boys Stake All to Get Victor's Crown

Douglas park tonight will be the scene of a virtually a championship 15-round bout between Al Van Ryn and Johnny Schauer, both of St. Paul.

Championship seems to be the suitable appellation for the bout that will determine the point of supremacy between these splendid lightweights. Otherwise words would fail.

Trained to the minute and trained to go, Van Ryn and Schauer have worked up tri-city enthusiasm to such a pitch that the question of one's superiority over the other is bit-trivial with all the interest of a title match.

"Battle to Death." Although no title will be at stake, the boys will be in there fighting for a furtive chance, maybe some day, to be matched with the best boys of their division. There need be no telling of what is held dear to them both, but, in oft-quoted words, it will be a battle to the death.

Promoter "Fat" Smith has done everything possible for the accommodation of a capacity "house," this being the first open-air boxing show every staged in Rock Island. "Fat" has provided several things to make the event an innovation in Rock Island boxing. He and his assistants have worked day and night to get the diamond arena in shape for the mill. Tonight will show how well they have succeeded in making this card one of the best.

Van in Grand Shape. Van Ryn arrived in town early this morning after a week's intensive training with Mike and Tommy Gibbons. Van has spent most of the time since last meeting Schauer, at a camp on one of the many lakes near St. Paul. He was sleek as a grayhound and tanned to a degree when here before. Today his tan is several shades darker and the lithe form of the trained athlete more pronounced.

Indications are that both boys will enter the ring at 134 pounds. Schauer worked out here yesterday afternoon and his admirers were led in praise of his condition. Van Ryn, having arrived only this morning, will indulge in no training, but his strenuous work with the Gibbons. Van believes he is in the best condition of his life and is out to stop or otherwise defeat Schauer as soon as possible.

To Exchange Cups. In order to allay all doubts as to possible foul blows, Promoter Smith has ordered that both boys display their cups to competent judges before the bout. There is quite apt to be much witness, particularly in the early rounds. In this event, the boy who uses the most caution will be at an advantage.

Van, with his superior boxing ability, may be able to withstand the wild, rushing in-fighting of Schauer, which is reputed to be the latter's best attack. Schauer is expected to use the same style, displayed in their former meeting, seeking to win as early as possible.

The fact that a grudge is said to exist between the battlers is not uncommon, but serves to boost the interest of the mill. Many have been egged on by their respective followings until they entered the ring, literally disposed to chop away vindictively. In this case, Van Ryn and Schauer, who is the veteran of the two, will meet for double reason.

Schauer the Veteran. Schauer is the veteran in point of activity, having engaged in several score fights. Van Ryn will enter the ring tonight for the 14th time. Schauer will be the trickier of the two, resorting to every tactic as utilized by the big fellows. Van Ryn, a student of the game in its finer points, will put to effect his best knowledge of how to stop his opponent. In addition to this, his tutoring by the Gibbons, is likely to stand out prominently.

I decline to predict any result until after I see the boys in action. I count it a misfortune never to have seen Schauer in the ring. However, both boys are grand little battlers, and tonight's engagement smacks of a toothsome dish for the tri-city boxing fraternity.

Looks Good All Through. The preliminaries have been arranged with utmost skill to round out a card that will probably open a new era in boxing hereabouts. In arranging the general details of the card, Paddy Quinn, co-promoter of "Fat" Smith, has worked like a Trojan, and deserves the highest praise.

Let's go!

RUTH REACHES FORMER RECORD FOR HOME RUNS

Babe's 50th Homer Yesterday Equals 1919 Mark with Season Only Half Over.

New York, July 15.—"Babe" Ruth in the 11th inning of the game between New York and St. Louis yesterday hit the ball over the top of the right field stand for a home run. The hit not only won the game for the Yankees, 13 to 10, but also equaled Ruth's record of 29 home runs made last year. Ward and Pipp were on base when Ruth made the hit. Under the 1920 rule the homer counts despite the fact that only one run was needed. Done in Half Season.

Ruth took but little more than half the season to equal his previous record. He failed to pound out a circuit smash in April, but made an even dozen more in May and June. His best performance was in the 13 games from May 23 to June 2, inclusive, in which period he added 19 to his total. His banner day was June 2 when he hit three home runs in a double header. He bunched a pair of his favorite four-base hits in one contest on four occasions, May 11, May 27, June 25 and June 30.

EVANS AND JONES CLASH FOR HONOR ON MEMPHIS LINKS

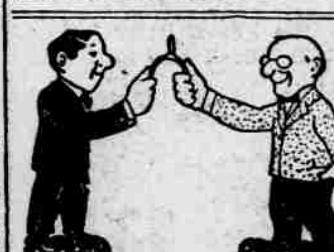

The nations listed to date are: Canada, Chile, Egypt, Denmark, Spain, the United States, Finland, England, Greece, Holland, Italy, Luxemburg, Poland, South Africa, Sweden, Switzerland, Czechoslovakia and Estonia.
