TEMPLE, TEX., WANTS MANAGER

Temple, Tex., Jan. 22.—It was considered certain here that Temple citizens will adopt the necessary changes contained in the new charter, draft of which was completed today, providing for a town manager form of government like that of Dayton, O. The proposed charter provides for the election of commissioners who in turn will select a town manager. The manager will have supreme control and be held accountable for all de-

partments of the municipal government. Temple will be the third town in Texas to adopt the town manager form in the past few months, Denton and Amarillo having already taken this step.

EMPLOYMENT AGENCY HAS ITS LICENSE REVOKED

The state board of labor commissioner yesterday sustained the charges of Richard J. Knight, chief inspector of labor agencies, by revoking the license of the Harrison Employment Agency, 27 W. Washington street.

The license, which was in the name of F. J. Boedeker, is admittedly the same one which O. C. Harris tried to have renewed last October and failed.
