

2. Abolishment of private employment agencies.

3. The "Blue Sky" law to protect investors from fake stock selling concerns.

4. Abolishment of the bureau of inspection of public offices, which it is claimed is merely a bureau to furnish jobs for political "lame ducks."

5. A law fixing a half mill levy for road building, so as to eliminate the

"pork barrel" system of legislation.

6. A law fixing taxes to be paid by the fish trust, which had escaped payment before.

7. An act consolidating under one head several state departments.

Each one of these measures had been proposed in the legislature, but a powerful machine of standpatters of both the Republican and Democratic parties, prevented any of them from coming to a vote.
