

### WAY GETS PERSONAL AND TEAM Y HONOR

Membership Campaign Is Successful - Gains 200 New Members - Wins 100 Renewals.

Lancelot Hadaway, with 100 points, who worked continually until the last minute, won the individual prize and the team honor of the Rock Island Y. M. C. A. membership campaign closed last evening. Three hundred new memberships and 100 renewals were secured during the week.

The winning team had a heavy handicap. Rev. Mr. Hadaway also won the individual prize and was accompanied by E. B. McKown last evening. His team obtained 1,420 points against the 1,273 for D. B. Mutt's team. Rev. Hadaway secured 591 points to his own credit, while his nearest competitor was Rudolf Fick and Frank Mutt, each with 296 1/2 points.

Jeff's team with A. B. Duvon as captain and F. W. Winter as major by a majority of 1,425 1/2 points. On behalf of his team Rev. Mr. Hadaway asked that the promised banquet to the winning team be held at the Y. M. C. A. instead of at the Blackhawk hotel, Davenport, as first planned. By actual count the campaign brought in \$2,473, but with the money to be sent in this week the total will be raised to about \$4,000. The Jeffs brought in 175 new members and 53 renewals and the Mutt's 115 new members with 56 renewals. The membership fee from today on will be \$12 per year for adults, instead of the old rate of \$10 a year.

Every organization is selecting its active men as workers in the campaign, and it is expected that the friendly rivalry and keen competition entered into between the various teams will help greatly in making the campaign a success. An active executive committee for the campaign is also being lined up for the drive and this committee will hold its meeting Friday noon. The organization for the drive will be completed by Thursday night and teams will enter the drive knowing that they are going in fully prepared to do the job laid out for them.

#### In the Day's News

General Julian S. Carr of Durham, N. C., who celebrates his 71st birthday today, is one of the foremost men of the south, with a fine record as an officer in the war between the states. After the war ended he turned to business, became a manufacturer, an investor in, and builder of railroads, a bank director, a trustee of educational and religious institutions, and a promoter of regional reconstruction on broad lines. As a Methodist he has figured prominently in great world conferences of Wesleyans held in London and elsewhere. During the war with Germany he served as head of the food conservation committee of the Methodist Episcopal church, South. He is prominent as a leader in the United Confederate Veterans and has held high commands in that organization.

### NEED ATTACKS WILSON LETTER

Charges President Had Promise To Send American Army and Navy Overseas.

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 12.—(United Press.)—President Wilson has confessed that he did promise "to send the American army and navy across the sea" to guarantee bound-

aries of Romania and Serbia. Senator James A. Reed said late yesterday in a statement attacking the White House version of the chief executive's peace conference Balkan speech, now in controversy.

"For the life of me," Reed said, "I cannot see how the stenographic report produced, in any way, helps the president's case. It is, in fact, a complete verification of the body of the charge heretofore made.

"Was the president standing and looking into the eyes of the Serbian and Rumanian delegates and telling them they expected us to send our armies and navies if any settlement of the covenant was not observed, and at the same time not meaning

to imply that the United States was assuming that obligation?"

"How absurd it is to pretend that we have not promised to send our armies and navies across the ocean."

Reed quoted from speeches by

President Wilson and his interview with the foreign relations committee and speeches of British leaders as backing up the senator's contention that President Wilson had made it plain America would contribute its share of an international

military force to protect the liberties of all league members.

**VACCINATE PASSENGERS.**  
New York, Oct. 12.—Vaccination of 1,335 passengers aboard the steamship Nieuw Amsterdam, which arrived here today from Rotterdam,
