CITY CLOSES DEFENSE IN \$5,000 SUIT FOR DAMAGES CONCLUDE EVIDENCE

EXPECTED JURY WILL GET CASE LATE THIS AFTERNOON WITH ARGUMENTS AS FINAL CHAPTER OF HARD FOUGHT LEGAL BATTLE.

The Du Shane-City damage case will probably go to the jury late this afternoon. At present today the closing arguments were being made by the attorneys.

Dr. A. J. Roberts, who attended the little Lila Du Shane in her final illness, took the stand this morning. He stated that the child could not possibly have contracted diphtheria and meningitis from the conditions represented by the plaintiff, as diphtheria is the form commonly applied for "true croup" and is a germ disease common among children contracted from a diphtheria germ and not from exposure.

He also stated that Francis Du Shane could not have contracted rheumatism from the damp condition of the house as represented as rheumatism is caused from infection.

He was followed by Dr. J. H. Edecomb, who corroborated the testimony of Dr. Roberts.

Owner of House Testifies. Yesterday afternoon Miss Minnie Boyle, owner of the premises on which Du Shane resided at the time of the high water, testified she said that she had not rented him the barn, which was located on the lot next door, owned by her brother.

Mrs. Viola Boyle was the next witness called. She described in detail on which the barn used by Du Shane was located as a piece of ground now just at the east end and with a deep hole at the west side. She stated that he did not rent Du Shane the lot or the barn, and that it had never been used with the house before that her brother had used the barn.

Owen Fox, former superintendent of streets, was the next witness called. Mr. Fox told of the night of Jan. 20, 1918, which is the time named by Du Shane as the night on which his property was flooded. He told of spending the entire night working, rescuing people from their homes who were cut off from the world by the high water, and of trying to keep the streets of South Ottawa free from water. The water, he testified, was declared, could not carry off the water fast enough from the streets as the rainfall was heavy, as if the frozen ground would not permit the water to seep in the earth.

ATTEMPT TO SNEAK ARMS INTO IRELAND FOUND BY BRITISH
