SCANTY SUPPLY ON HAND BOOSTS CORN

(By the Associated Press) Chicago, March 29.—Higher prices in the corn market resulted today to a considerable extent from scantiness of the stock on hand here and from the fact that receipts this morning gave no indication of any important increase of the crop movement. Crippling of wire service, however, cut demand almost entirely to Chicago traders. Besides, corn was current that plans were worked out for a better distribution of railways. Opening prices, which ranged from 40 to 45 higher with May \$1.04 to \$1.06 and July \$1.04 to \$1.05, were followed by a slight general setback, and then by new upturns.

PENN WINS TITLE: BEATS CHICAGO 23 21

Princeton, N. J., March 29.—Pennsylvania University won the national collegiate championship Saturday evening when the Red and Blue defeated Chicago in the third and deciding game of the Tiger's court by a 23 to 21 score, thereby only leading Chicago by one shot. Chicago had won the first battle and Penn succeeded in coping off the second one which made it necessary to play the third one on neutral grounds. The place selected for the game was Princeton. Approximately 1,500 spectators witnessed the struggle.
