Railway traffic difficulties were largely responsible and so too was activity of export call for breadstuffs. Compared with a week ago corn quotations this morning showed to be 5 1/2c advance, oats varied from 1 1/2c decline to 1/4c gain and provisions were up 2 1/2c to 6c.
