

LOWDEN MANAGERS CLAIM OPPONENTS ARE "COVERING UP"

BACKERS OF GOVERNOR IN PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION CAMPAIGN INSIST WOOD, JOHNSON AND OTHERS IN RACE TELL ALL ABOUT FUNDS.

Springfield, May 25.—Gov. Lowden's campaign managers demanded last night that every candidate for the presidency be compelled to "come clean" on campaign expenditures. In effect, the Lowden camp declared that because the Illinois governor told the whole truth about his own war chest, he shall not be made the "nose" of the senate's pending inquiry.

The statement made by Louis L. Emmerich, chairman of the Lowden campaign committee, who returned yesterday afternoon after having testified in Washington, is that other candidates should not be permitted to dodge behind "voluntary campaign organizations," or "to take advantage of any technical subterfuge."

Last afternoon reports from Washington, tending to suggest that the investigation is not to be pressed to the limit, caused various types of reaction along presidential rows. The Lowden managers, having placed their cards on the table, it was believed, were relieved in demanding that the senatorial probe be plunged into every activity of other candidates.

The Wood camp, which has been restless ever since the investigation started, was nearly unanimous in saying that the investigation will serve the republican party, and that no record is being done from the testimony. Johnson headquarters looked a pair of statements, the last directed particularly at Emmerich's campaign. However, just Harding headquarters remained officially silent.

Secretary of State Rhoads, from Washington, did not miss words in stating his views of the situation, as follows:

"Gov. Lowden's campaign testimony has always met me and there has been nothing to conceal, either in connection with his presidential campaign. With that safely met, we have kept faith. That was our purpose in presenting a complete and full official statement of our campaign expenses to the senate committee in Washington."

"We fully expect, and we believe that we have the unqualified right to insist, that each of the other candidates shall be exposed in public to the presentation of their own full and complete statement of their campaign expenses and expenditures. We have no doubt that the senate committee will proceed upon that theory."

"We have reported to the senate in producing the facts, we have not attempted to hide behind any voluntary organizations in any sense. We have no reason to think that the senate committee will permit any other candidate to take advantage of any technical subterfuge."

The Johnson side of the investigation contained in this statement given out by Mayor James of Los Angeles, in charge of Johnson headquarters at the Auditorium hotel:

"The senatorial investigating committee is doing a great public service, but the testimony that is being given illustrates the difficulty in getting at the bottom of the matter. Mr. Lucey, for example, testifies that Hoover paid him approximately \$60,000 for everything in the nation except California. How can you get the statement of it any by saying by the fact that it may be confidentially stated that Hoover expended over \$100,000 in one city alone. I refer to the city of Los Angeles. I know what I speak in this matter, because I was in charge of the Johnson campaign in that city."

"What is revealed by way of escape in an intensive campaign such as was made for Hoover in Los Angeles and for Wood, Lowden, and other candidates in many other places may be gathered from these facts. On the day after the election at Hoover's headquarters in Los Angeles a whole regiment of hired workmen was paid off. The checks ran as high as \$42.50.

"On election day hundreds of automobiles were lined up 225 each. Hoover paid out over \$5,000 for advertising in one Los Angeles newspaper alone and his ads ran in several hundred newspapers throughout the state."

"Hoover sent literature to every one of more than 200,000 registered voters in Los Angeles, under a recent stamp and this was done throughout the state where there are more than one million registered voters. Not less than \$75,000 was sent dispersed for circulation in California."

At Wood headquarters, no formal statement was issued regarding the Washington investigation. It was said that Col. William Clegg, Director, Chairman of the Wood campaign organization, is in New York and expects to go to Washington from there prepared to testify before the senate committee.

HARDING TELLS HOW TO CUT H. C. L.—SAVE WORK AND LESS LOANS

Washington, May 26.—Economy in individual expenditures, reduction of governmental loans by means of increased production and improved transportation are needed to reduce the cost of living and defuse inflation, Gov. Harding in the federal reserve board declared today in response to a committee of inquiry.

The board is not expected to define what is meant by "economy" in individual expenditures and how it is to be attained. Governor Harding stated that, in his opinion, it is possible for local banks to handle the loan business.

Harding's remarks were presented to the board in response to the suggestion of Senator McPherson, Republican, who adopted, yesterday, a resolution requesting investigation with regard to what steps the board contemplates for the reduction of inflation and what measures were proposed to mobilize funds for the payment of the 1920 crop.

Following the board's agreement to request the board members, including Harding, and to be in session at 10 o'clock next week, Gov. Harding said that the board has agreed that the examination of the board is necessary in a number of respects, including the production and transportation of goods.

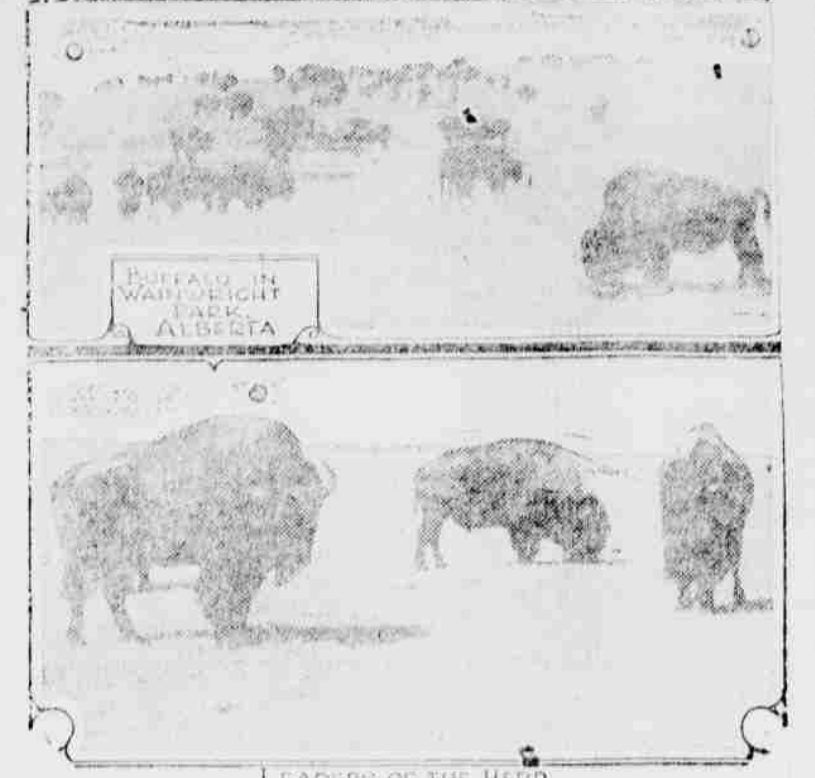
"The board is convinced," Governor Harding continued, "that if the cost of living of last year's crops can be brought to market before the new crop matures, the fluctuations of cost, which are now being carried over, will be adjusted to fit in to a considerable degree the cost of the new crop."

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Buffalo Saved from Extinction Flourish in Government Parks



EDMONTON, ALTA. — Once threatened with extinction, the buffalo is coming back. Only 891 were left in North America in 1889. Today, according to last year's census of the American Bison Society, there are 7,370 in Canada and the United States.

Canada took the lead in the preservation of the buffalo when in 1907 it purchased the herd of 1,200 in Montana, numbering 700 head. These were shipped to Wainwright, Alta., where they were set free in a government park, the largest game preserve in the world, containing 100,000 acres surrounded by twenty-six miles of mesh wire. The buffalo, now numbering 3,520, have made the park on the Grand Trunk Pacific railway, one of the show places of western Canada.

Thousands of tourists stop there on their way to the scenic wonderland of Jasper Park in the Rocky Mountains. A wild herd in the Athabasca region, estimated at 500 head, and several small herds in captivity, swell the total number of buffalo in Canada to 4,250.

The United States, which also took steps to safeguard the buffalo, now has eight parks in which they are bred. The largest government herd is in Yellowstone Park and on bison ranges at Ravalli, Mont., and Cache, Okla. There are now 3,120 buffalo in the United States.

When the white man came, it is estimated there were 15,000,000 buffalo in America. The slaughter of these immense herds, which has been called the greatest crime ever perpetrated against a race of wild animals, did not cease until the early eighties.
