Philadelphia, Pa., May 28.—What is expected to be the most closely contested meet ever held by the Inter-collegiate Amateur Athletic Association.

GOLFERS' EYES TURN TO TOLEDO COURSE

Toledo, Ohio.—Expert golf courses architects and green keepers have started to work on the grooming of the links of the Inverness Country Club to make sure that it will be worthy of the international character to be given the National Open Golf championship to be played here Aug. 15-17. Harry Vardon and Edward Ray are to take part in the meet, and possibly other Britons.

Par for the course is 35-37.2 for a total yardage of 7,417; but this will be changed somewhat so that the par will be 36-37.2 and the length 7,500 yards. The links are said to be approximately three strokes more difficult than Maunfield, Scotland, where the 18th championship is to be played this year, but to make sure that the difficulties consist of nothing but scientific bunkering and arrangement, the club managers have set to work to make every inch of the course as nearly perfect as possible.

The links does not punish short or long drives provided they are properly placed, but the golfer who is inclined to "take a chance" hitting him self out for distance rather than direction will find the course that of late a problem for mathematical calculations of superlative dimensions. New bunkering on the course will, it is said, increase the hazard on each misplaced shot about seventy per cent.

Special attention has been paid to the second shot in which judgment of distance, control of direction and the rest of ability to get homes make the difference between a birdie or a par plus one.
