

LOONEY IN SUPREME COURT

(Continued from First Page.)

It is customary for the proceedings to be referred to the master in chancery of the county in which the defendant resides. Then the arguments of both sides are heard.

If the decision is against the defendant his name is stricken from the records as a licensed attorney.

The information against Looney was drawn by John L. Pogle, attorney for the Chicago Bar association, and an expert in disbarment matters. The action is directed by attorney-General Brundage. Disbarment matters can be instituted by the state's attorney or by the association of the county in which the defendant attorney practices, as well as by the attorney-general. The attorney-general's charges follow:

"How comes Edward J. Brundage, attorney-general of the state of Illinois, on behalf of the people of the state of Illinois, and gives this honorable court to understand and inform:

"That John P. Looney was by this court on or about the 23rd day of March, A. D. 1889, admitted and licensed as an attorney and counselor at law of the state of Illinois, under the then existing rules of this honorable court, and his name entered on the roll of attorneys as an attorney and counselor at law of the state of Illinois, and that until very shortly previous to the presentation of this petition said John P. Looney for many years resided and engaged in business in the city of Rock Island, Ill.

FIRST COUNT.

"That for approximately twenty years prior to the 11th day of November, A. D. 1922, said respondent was the principal owner and sole editor and publisher of a weekly newspaper of general circulation known as 'The Rock Island News'. That for many years last past said newspaper has been printed, published and circulated by the respondent in the said city of Rock Island and circulated in adjoining cities and towns. That said paper during all of said time has been a purveyor of scandal. That the method followed by said respondent in publishing said paper has been to pry into the personal secrets of the residents of Rock Island, to uncover the skeletons in his neighbors' closets, to discover some little false step, error or mistake made either in the present or the past by such residents, thereupon to magnify the same into the most horrible form the distorted brain of the respondent could contrive and invent. It was then the habit of respondent to call the same to the attention of the persons involved

and to publish the same as an exposure of such resident in said newspaper to the reading regard of each resident, his family and friends and the persons involved or his or her family or some one in authority at his or her present abode. The holding of said respondent. That said respondent during the five years last past published and circulated or caused to be circulated as aforesaid in and by said Rock Island News innumerable articles of the character aforesaid in particular cases affecting many of the residents of said Rock Island and adjoining cities and towns, which said articles were false, malicious, unjustified or exaggerated, and by means of the foregoing the said respondent through the fear of being thus written up in said newspaper secured domination over almost the entire private and official life of said city of Rock Island and of the citizens, residents and officials thereof. That particular specifications of each offense of the character aforesaid, committed by respondent during the period aforesaid would be burdensome to the court if set out hereinafter, and are unnecessary for the information of respondent as every weekly issue of said Rock Island News contained one or more and sometimes many articles of such character and purpose. That said newspaper, by reason of the matters and things aforesaid, was on or about Jan. 1, 1921, barred from the United States mails by the officials of the United States postoffice and has since been circulated by respondent through carriers.

SECOND COUNT.

"That the domination of such private and official life of the citizens of said city of Rock Island gained by said respondent by the means aforesaid as set out in the first count of this information was used by said respondent for ulterior motives and for enriching himself. That by means thereof the respondent forced the owners and proprietors of houses of prostitution, gambling resorts and places where intoxicating liquors were unlawfully sold to make regular weekly or monthly payments of money to said respondent, sometimes under the guise of payments for advertisements, as in case of the so-called soft drink parlors in which intoxicating liquors were unlawfully sold, or directly as in cases of owners of houses of prostitution. That during the year previous to Nov. 11, 1922, said respondent unlawfully and fraudulently collected many thousands of dollars in this method and converted the same to his own use.

THIRD COUNT.

"That by the means aforesaid and through purchase of money secured as aforesaid and through the publication and circulation of said alleged newspaper said respondent secured a proprietary interest in and during the year 1921, as the owner or part owner of two certain houses in said city of Rock Island known as the Rex hotel and the Sherman hotel, respectively. That said houses were known as disorderly houses and to the knowledge and consent of respondent were frequented and tenanted by lewd women, who openly and brazenly carried on their trade or occupation under the protection of said respondent, and that said respondent from time to time collected and was paid a percentage of the earnings of the said lewd women occupying and frequently said houses.

FOURTH COUNT.

"That all the foregoing and other matters have been fully disclosed and brought out by overwhelming testimony before a special grand jury now sitting in Rock Island county and that said grand jury has returned indictments against said respondent charging said respondent with the following specific offenses against the laws of the state of Illinois, to-wit: Conspiring to violate the laws on gambling, conspiracy to commit murder, receiving stolen property, conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws of the state and United States. That said respondent was also indicted in the federal court at Peoria on Oct. 24, 1922, for receiving stolen property, but that said indictments only partially cover the offenses committed by respondent demonstrating his unfitness to retain his license from this honorable court.

"That the actions of the respondent were and are unprofessional, dishonorable and criminal; that they and each of them denote a lack of

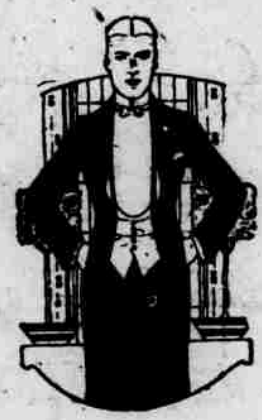

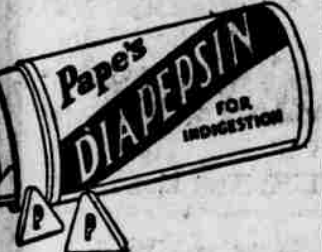

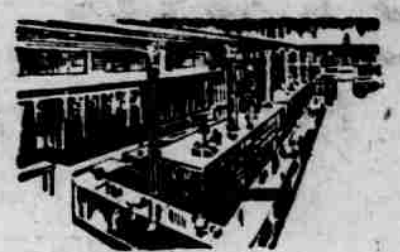
