

WIFE GONE
 In the Police Wagon and Bradford
 Not Long—Whisky Permit
 That Suspended.

Dope vials stolen from the office
 of Dr. Harry Frey and Dr. Ed
 Bradford, Saturday night, were
 found this morning with the excep-
 tion of the morphine vials, in the
 rear of the office of the Empire Coal
 and Ice company, 215 Twentieth
 street.

The dope was found by one of the
 employees and reported to the police.
 Dr. Bradford identified the narcot-
 ics at the station and said that the
 dope missing was valued at about
 \$2. One of the bank books from the
 office that was also contained in the
 package was found, but another
 was still missing. Dr. Bradford
 also said that several valuable
 papers were still missing, but that
 the papers would be of no value to
 anyone besides him.

It was evident that the thieves
 were dope addicts because all of the
 morphine and cocaine, which was
 a small amount, was removed from
 the package and drugs which would
 be of no use to the addicts was
 left. This morning Officer Harry
 Fitzsimmons, who was looking over
 the ground where the dope was
 found behind the coal office, found
 two more of the small vials and
 brought them to the police station.

Whisky Permit Theft.
 The Saturday night theft at the
 Bradford and Frey office was the
 second time that the office had been
 entered and searched. Several
 weeks ago a book of permits of the
 type issued by physicians for
 whisky to be used for sickness was
 taken from the office. Only one per-
 mit had been used from the book
 and 99 were contained in the pad,
 which was stolen. The permits rep-
 resent no loss to the physicians,
 only that each physician is allotted
 a certain amount each month and
 would not be able to obtain any
 again until the next time of issue.
 Dr. Bradford said this morning
 that he was probably the one who
 permit thieves took the permits to
 Chicago or some other city and
 used fictitious physicians' names.
 This theft was not reported to the
 police. It is not believed that the
 same persons who took the dope
 were responsible for the whisky
 permit loss.

Rock Island came into promi-
 nence in dope activities when a
 cargo valued at more than \$10,000
 was found in a quantity of army
 belts at the home of A. D. Harris,
 304 Fortieth street. Harris claimed
 that he had purchased the belts at
 a legitimate auction at Camp Grant
 and did not know that the dope was
 in the belts. Friday Harris was
 bound over to the federal grand
 jury under a bond of \$2,000 at a
 hearing before United States Com-
 missioner Thomas P. Sennett.

Safe Rallded.
 The safe in the offices of the in-
 ternal revenue collector in the
 Rock Island federal building was
 also entered at week by parties in
 search of the Harris dope supply
 which was believed to have been
 placed there before being sent to
 the federal authorities. Police be-
 lieve that the same persons who
 opened the safe at the internal re-
 venue office are responsible for the
 theft at the physicians' offices in
 the Best building.

BURGLARS SECURE SAVINGS STAMPS
