

BEST TWO IN PLOT TO BLOW THEATRE SAFE

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Some of the crimes which police have reason to believe these men took part in are the recent robbery of the Black Hawk Furniture company's safe, on Fourth avenue, theft of a Dodge roadster in Davenport several days ago, passing of forged checks, manufacturing and selling liquor, and numerous petty larcenies of accessories and tools from automobiles.

In addition these two men, and probably others whom they police are tracing, are strongly suspected of having been impugned here by members of the local immunity ring for the purpose of murdering persons who have been active in suppressing that combination in late weeks. Responsible members of the police department made these statements last night after the arrests were made and the prisoners had been quizzed.

Enough evidence is in hand against Kaszowski, referred to as Stanley by the police, to insure his return to the penitentiary, it is believed. A quantity of articles believed to be stolen goods, was found in his room. The tip which led to Kaszowski's arrest came from Davenport, where the department received reliable information that "Stanley" and "Chicago Whitey" were to take part in robbing the Capitol theatre safe last night. Information was complete enough to permit seizure of the man early in the night, before he had a chance to get out on the job. Fordley was accordingly picked up in Davenport at 10 o'clock.

Raid Mikas House. At 10:45 o'clock Detectives Dennis Bennett, Earl Shannon and Herman Schmitt led a picked force of five police patrolmen to surround the house occupied by the family of Charles Mikas, 817 Second avenue, where Stanley or Kaszowski, resides in a rented room. Stanley was found in bed and offered no resistance to arrest. Mikas was also taken along, but after a careful examination by the detectives at police headquarters he was dismissed from custody. He is believed not to have been connected with the alleged operations of the two suspected "bump-off" men, as he proved that he was a hard-working man who had rented a room to a fellow-countryman in good faith.

In search of the house the police found two small stills, a keg of whisky mash, and a half gallon of white mule liquor. Quantities of automobile accessories and tools found secreted in Stanley's room and closets included a Ford sedan rug, a half dozen automobile keys for various makes of cars—these were laid upon the top of the work-around the doors and windows in his room—a kit of tools, a flashlight, several tire testers, and other articles. He also had two bunches of serviceable skeleton keys. In the pockets of his clothing were two newspaper clippings, one from The Argus describing the

He was careless enough to leave lying loosely around a quantity of letters, note books and other papers from which the detectives believe they can trace him and his confederates accurately.

Tells of Third Man. One of the important leads the Illinois and Iowa detectives operated on last night, and were to continue today, is that of a third man who, if he exists, is supposed to have custody of the Dodge roadster referred to. Kaszowski referred to this person in a vague way, seeming unable to describe his exact place of residence in Davenport and his exact appearance. It was this third man whom Kaszowski said owned most of the supposedly stolen articles found in the room in the Mikas house.

Search for the missing Dodge car was really the keynote of the hunt today. It is believed to be either secreted in some public or private garage in the tri-cities, in the mysterious third man's possession here or elsewhere, or traveling away from the tri-cities in the hands of a purchaser of the machine. Stanley, or Kaszowski, lapses into badly broken English when asked about it and Mikas apparently has the same difficulty.

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
