CHICAGO BABIES WILL BE TAKEN CARE OF IF STRIKE COMES

Says Health Commissioner Robertson—Milk Can Be
Obtained—Ice Shortage the Stumbling Block—
Fear Milk Companies Plan Clean-Up by Raise.

"Milk and ice so that thousands of Chicago's babies will not die," will be Chicago's slogan in the event of a railroad strike if the city administration acts along the lines advocated by Com'r of Public Works Moorhouse.

Moorhouse said the welfare of the babies must be the first consideration. His plea was made at the con-

ference of Mayor Thompson and his official cabinet held in the City Hall at noon today.

Health Com'r Robertson said that after a careful investigation he had found that the city can be supplied with 80 per cent of its normal amount of milk and that he sees no reason for a rise in the price of milk. Even if there should be a complete tieup of
