Q. We are strongly opposed to the removal of tonsils, but our child of five has had an unhealthy condition of the tonsils. The doctor says they should be removed. We think it a crime. Will you please tell us what to do in such a family health and disease condition?

A. The child's tonsils are enlarged and he has frequent attacks of hay fever, cough, croup, the pain of the throat, or any other condition. I am sure you realize that the tonsils prevent the removal of the bacteria. Because you would be better satisfied to have the operation of two or three times a year.

Mastication of Food.
Q. Will you please tell me how a child of five can be made to masticate his food?

A. A child of five can be made to masticate his food by your constant presence in his meals and insistence on his proper chewing. A resourceful mother will find many ways of getting results. You might gain his interest by having him count the number of times he chews each mouthful or various kinds of food. Little children are usually proud of their ability to count. Old customs will doubtless occur to you.

Mouth Breathing.

Q. I have a little girl of a year and a half who has been unable to sleep with her mouth open. It is so I prevent it? She has some abdominal pain.

A. The child sleeps with her mouth open because her breathing is obstructed, probably by adenoids. You will not be able to prevent it while the obstruction is present. Take her to your family physician or to a good nose and throat specialist.

Circulatory Troubles.

Q. I am 52 years old, but I always had a ruddy complexion and very fair hair. Now in the last few years I notice my face will be red and I feel warm to a bluish gray color. I suffer with cold feet. Will you kindly tell me the cause of this and a cure. Bowels are regular.

A. As a rule when the skin turns a bluish gray some serious circulatory trouble is indicated. This would seem to be the more likely in your case, since you say you suffer with cold feet. This indicates stagnation of the blood in the feet, or in the blood vessels. In a person of your years the action plan to prevent a serious ailment is a thorough examination to find out just what is wrong, so that the examination include a determination of the urine.

Live Electric Plants.
There are to get along in species of electrical fish, but the electrical properties of only one or two have been studied in detail. The best known are Xiphias species of torpedo, belonging to the shark family found in the Mediterranean and Atlantic coast of the continent, an octopus in the region of the Orinoco in South America, the hydrobatulus, the tunicate or cucumber fish of the Arctic, a native of the Nile, the Notothen and others. All are electric and various species of electric fish in the seas around Great Britain.
