

BRITAIN'S TERMS OF PEACE READ TO ULSTER CABINET

OPINIONS WERE NOT FORTH-COMING AT CONCLUSION OF MEETING IN BELFAST—EXPECT CONFERENCES TO BE RESUMED.

Belfast, July 22.—A copy of the Irish peace terms handed by Premier Lloyd George yesterday to Eamon de Valera was placed before and considered by the Ulster cabinet today. No opinion on the terms was expressed by the British prime minister it is stated and none has been given.

London, July 22.—The British government's proposal to Eamon de Valera the Irish republican leader, for peace in Ireland probably will not be made public until a definite reply to the government's terms has been received from the Sinn Fein leaders in Dublin, it was stated today.

It was expected Mr. Lloyd George will be able to make a comprehensive statement concerning the peace terms in the house of commons next week.

A Belfast View.

Belfast, July 22.—What may be considered a typical Ulster view of the Irish situation is given today by the Belfast News Letter.

"We are convinced," it says, "that until the government presents a definite final decision that admits of no hagglings to the Sinn Fein leaders they will continue to persist in demanding the impossible. They cannot be blamed for this unwilling attitude, for the fault lies in the government's own indetermined, feeble action."

The Northern Whig says that if Mr. De Valera elects to proceed with the struggle, the loyalists will be less disappointed, because they have never surrendered to the clamour of illusions born of persistent misreading of the facts."

The newspaper expresses the opinion that if Mr. De Valera returns to London to inform Mr. Lloyd George that he has brought a basis for negotiations or is anxious to resume the search for one an anxious time for the northern loyalists will ensue. Expect Conferences to Be Resumed.

Dublin, July 22.—Belief that the conversations between Eamon de Valera and Premier Lloyd George will be resumed is expressed by the Freeman's Journal in its comment on the peace negotiations today. The interview between the two men in London yesterday was evidently not their last, the newspaper says. The Irish Times considers that the public will decline satisfaction from the fact that the proposals submitted emanated from the coalition cabinet, which Mr. De Valera did not feel justified in immediately turning down.

Sealed bids will be received for the construction of the improvement of parts of De Kalb and other streets in the northwest part of the City of Ottawa by the Council of August, A. D. 1921, at the hour of 7:30 p. m., at the City Office in the Central Life Building in said City of Ottawa, Illinois, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened.

It is estimated that there will be about the following amounts of work to be done and materials to be furnished:

320 lineal feet of 8-inch pipe sewer, 420 lineal feet of 6-inch pipe sewer, for house connections; two manholes, for catch basins, and 20 cubic yards of rock excavation.

Said improvement shall be constructed and made in accordance with the ordinance providing for the same and the maps, plats, plans and specifications for the same on file in the office of the City Clerk.

Proposals must be made on blanks furnished by said Council and in compliance with the instructions thereto attached, which can be had on application to the City Clerk, and must be accompanied by cash or by check payable to the order of the Mayor in his official capacity, certified by a responsible bank for an amount of not less than ten per cent (10 per cent) of the aggregate of the proposal.

The contractor shall be paid in bonds, bearing the rate of five per cent (5 per cent) per annum.

No bid will be received unless the party offering it shall furnish evidence that he has the necessary facilities, ability and pecuniary resources to fulfill the condition of the contract and execute the work, should the contract be awarded to him.

Bidders will examine the ordinances, maps, plats, plans, specifications and also the locality in which said work is to be done and judge for themselves all of the conditions and circumstances affecting the cost and nature of the work.
