Lynch was put into the fray in the second inning, after Pitcher Siegrist had been knocked out of the box. Siegrist started on the mound for Henry, but didn't fare very well. During his time on the rubber, Ward Miller, former Chicago Cub star; Shorty Sheldon, member of the local aggregation, and several other heavies on the Ohio team knocked him all over the lot, and Ohio scored five runs off his offerings.

Charlie Roth, star catcher for the Cubs, is also playing with the Henry aggregation. Roth eluded Pitcher Romine's first offering for a circuit drive. His backstopping was excellent and he, together with Jimmy, were touted as being the "big boys" of the tournament.

BRITISH TENNIS TEAMS ELIMINATED

Boston, Mass., Aug. 24.—All British aspirations for American lawn tennis championships were eliminated yesterday when three teams from overseas were eliminated by American combinations in the second round of the title tournament on the courts of the Longwood Cricket club. The English Davis cup combination of Woodman and Turnbull was defeated by L. E. Williams and Fritz Bastian, middle western champions, 7-6-3, 6-3, 6-4.

The British team of Lowe and Myer lost in straight sets to Handy and Bell, 6-2, 6-4, 6-1. The Kinsey brothers defeated Gilbert and Vencken, a third British team, 6-2, 6-2, 6-4.

Vogel and Hardy put out Greenough and Putnam in straight sets, but with some difficulty. Davis Cup Pair Win. Williams and Washburn had an easy time of it with the Providence combination of Dana and Shaw, allowing their opponents only two games in the first two sets. They clinched their catch in the third set, but only after Dana and Shaw had won more games than in the previous two sets.

Shaw twice and Dana once made their service game victors, but the Davis cup combination broke through at other times to get the necessary six games. The middle western titleholders, Williams and Bastian, displayed best tennis of the day in defeat of the British doubles champions, W. Mann and Turnbull. They will be to another severe test today when they meet William T. Tilden II. and Vincent Richards.

To Remove Lead in a Gun Barrel. Chemically pure and strong nitric acid will dissolve the lead and attack the metal of a gun barrel until the acid becomes diluted with a little water. To remove the acid, pour it out and wipe the gun dry with a rag soaked in olive or cotton seed oil. Do not get the acid on the hat or clothing. If, by chance, this happens, wash it off immediately with water and then with some weak alkali.
