

THREATENS LIFE OF CORDOVA MAN

Clinton Resident Brandishes Shot Gun in Face of River Camper.

AUTHORITIES IN PURSUIT

Deputy Sheriffs Scouring Woods in Effort to Land Party—Capture Expected.

A deputy sheriff today scoured the woods along the Mississippi river north of Cordova, in an effort to apprehend H. W. Campbell of Clinton who last Thursday approached the camp of A. J. Simpson and brandishing a shot gun, threatened to kill the owner, according to the latter's statement in police court this morning, where a warrant was secured. The authorities believe they will land their man before night.

CUTS DECOYS

According to Simpson's story, last Thursday Campbell entered his camp and with apparently no provocation began to abuse the proprietor, accusing him of acts of which he had no knowledge. All efforts at denial only infuriated Campbell the more, and brandishing a shot gun, he yelled: "I am going to blow your legs off." He then threatened to shoot Simpson's launch so full of holes that the craft would never float again. After uttering other threats, the first individual departed, but that night, stole down upon the camp and rowing out into the river cut loose 12 decoys which were in the water, allowing them to float down stream.

Fearing for his life, Simpson appealed to the police this morning for a warrant and also asked that when captured, Campbell be put under a peace bond.

METER THIEF IS BOUND OVER TODAY

ROWDIES ATTACK EXPRESS DRIVER

Arthur Crowley Has One Arm Broken and Head Injured in Fight With Gang.

A murderous assault was made on Arthur Crowley, a driver for the Trefz Express and Transfer company, yesterday afternoon at the oil cloth works on Mill street by a gang of thugs who frequent that vicinity. Crowley was dispatched to the oil cloth works to secure a load of oil cloth and while loading it on his wagon was approached by the gang. It seems as though he had had trouble with the same fellows before and that they had threatened to "get him" the next time they saw him.

Words followed after the gang had approached the wagon and Crowley was called several vile names and dared to get off his wagon. "I will not allow any man to call me those names," said Crowley and he jumped off his wagon. He was immediately attacked by the whole gang, one of whom had a big club with which he made a swing at Crowley's head. Crowley threw up his right arm to guard his head and had his arm broken like a straw. As he fell a second blow descended striking him on the head, inflicting a severe gash.

The injured man lay on the ground for over a half hour groaning in pain, not one of the gang offering to assist him, till he recovered sufficiently to crawl into his wagon and drive to a physician's office. Crowley was badly injured and it will be some time before he can resume his duties as driver of the transfer company.

The name of the ringleader of the gang is known and his arrest is expected to follow soon.

CALLING ATTENTION TO LAYMEN'S MEET

The members of the executive committee in charge of the tri-city convention of the Laymen's Missionary movement are leaving no stone unturned to get the values of the convention to the attention of the men of northwestern Illinois and southeastern Iowa. Executive Secretary Clapp presented the matter last night to the county Christian Endeavor convention which had its annual meeting in the First Christian church. World-wide missions will be the theme and to civilize and Christianize those savage and semi-barbarous people who through increased trade relations and transportation facilities have become in truth our next door neighbors.
