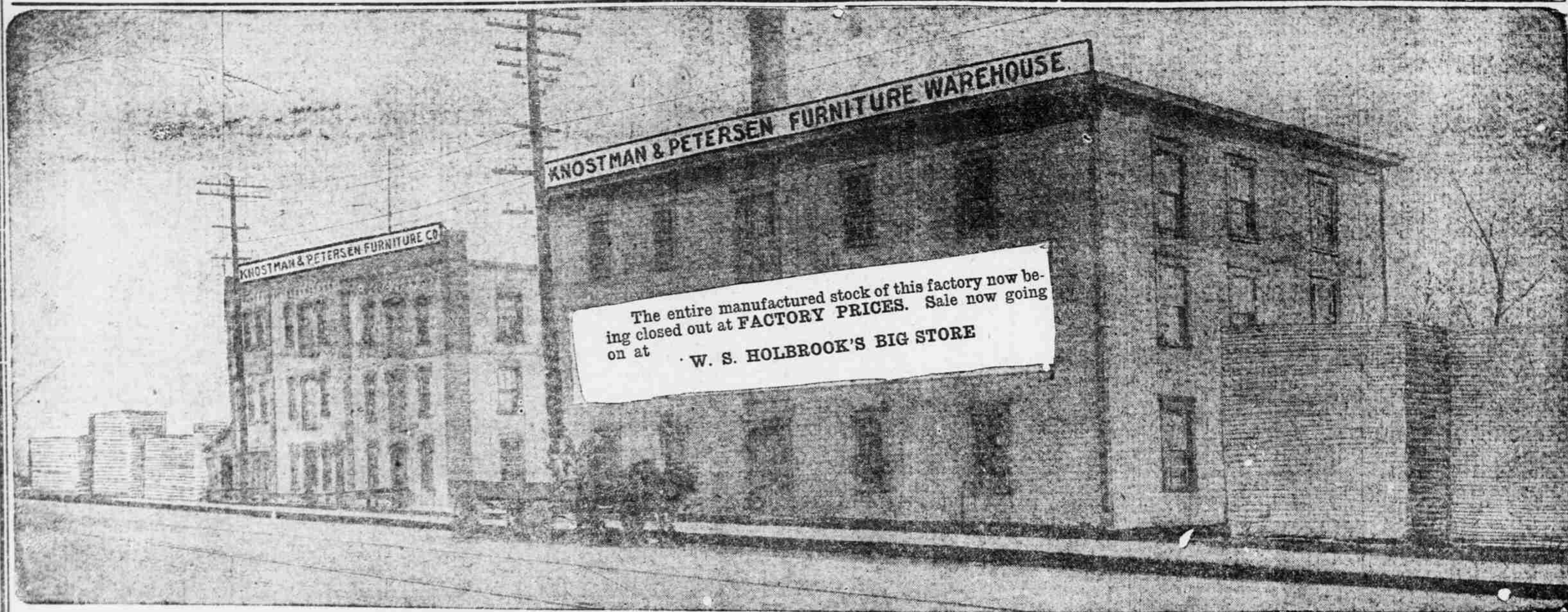

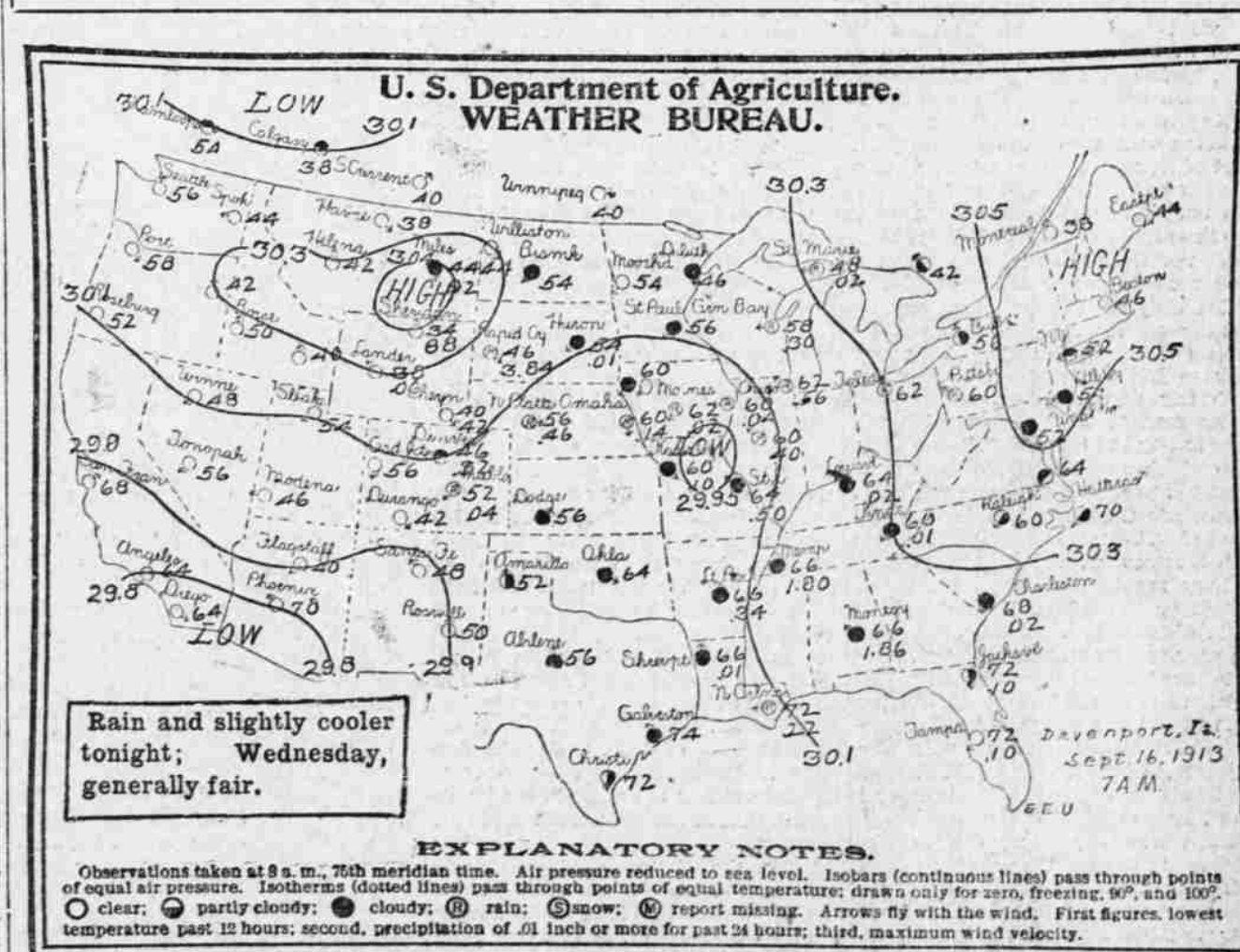

WAGNER'S REVIEW

Morning Grain Letter.
Chicago, Sept. 16.—Wheat cables 1/2 and 3/4 lower, reflecting easier Winnipeg market yesterday. Looks like trading affair, but prefer working from the buying side for possibilities there is in same.
Corn cables 3/4 lower. Showers and rains scattered throughout the belt. Local stock of corn increased for the week 56,000 bushels. Today's weather conditions are expected to change the trend of the market temporarily and give lower prices.
Oats—Local stocks show a slight increase for the week but are still heavy. Canadian exports of oats have ranged during last five years from 3 1/2 million up to 10 million. Feel friendly on minor reactions from here.
Wet Blanket on Grain.
Chicago, Sept. 16.—Weekly government forecast prophesying a fair amount of moisture for the entire grain belt acted as a wet blanket on the grains today.
An active demand continues for cash wheat both to domestic millers and exporters. The southwestern states report considerable wheat feeding and millers are reporting good sales of flour. We feel that this cereal is a purchase at this level.
Corn market today is a disappointment to its friends and further recession is probable. We see nothing to change our views and advise the placing of purchasing resting orders.
Oats held well. Receipts are moderate considering the size of the crop. Less heard of Canadian importations. The high price of feeding substitutes should prove a help to the price.
Reports of hog cholera, though not yet a market factor, promise to be one to the provision market.
Stahl a Semi-Pro.
Jake Stahl, manager of the world's champions in 1912, will become a semi-pro manager for the second time in his career when he becomes boss of the Jake Stahl club, starting next Sunday. The present manager of the team, Smith, will turn over the team at next Sunday's game at Peru, Ind. Stahl will play first base for the club, from now on and expects to make it one of the big clubs on the local circuit next year.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.
The gulf storm which has moved from Louisiana to southeastern Iowa and the low which remains over Arizona and southern California have caused rains in the Mississippi, Ohio and lower Missouri valleys and the lake region and on the gulf and south Atlantic coasts and showers on the eastern Rocky mountain slope. The following heavy rains are noted in inches: Rapid City, S. D., 3.84; Montgomery, 1.86; Memphis, 1.80. The crest of the northeastern high overlies the north Atlantic coast, while the northwestern area of high pressure and fair, cool weather covers the northern Rocky mountain sections.

Frosts have occurred in Idaho, Wyoming and northern Minnesota. The eastward movement of the low and the approach of the northwestern high will be attended by rain and slightly cooler in this vicinity tonight, followed by generally fair weather Wednesday.
