Matron and Wagon Maker Wanted By Federal Government in Minnesota and Oregon.
The United States Civil Service Commission announces an examination on August 28, 1907, at Cairo, Ill., to secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill one vacancy in the position of seamstress (female) at \$420 per annum, in the Indian service at Pine Point, Minn.; one vacancy in the position of assistant matron (female), at \$400 per annum, in the Indian service at Fort Berthold, N. Dak.; one vacancy in the position of seamstress (female), at \$400 per annum, in the Indian service at Fena, Minn.; one vacancy in the position of assistant matron, at \$420 per annum, in the Indian service at Seger Colony, Okla.; one vacancy in the position of assistant matron, at \$400 per annum, in the Indian service at Wapato, Springs, Indian Territory, at Wapato, Okla. as they may occur in the positions of matron, seamstress, and female industrial teacher.
August 28—To fill a vacancy in the position of wagon maker \$720 per annum, in the Indian school at Salem, Ore., and vacancies as they may occur in any branch of the service requiring similar qualifications.
The duties of the position require that the person selected should be a wagon maker, able to build and to supervise the building of heavy farm wagons, light wagons, and spring wagons.
