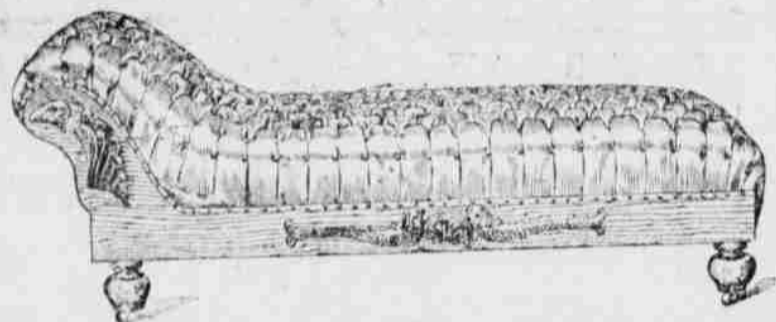

CATHOLIC NOTES.

The pews have been moved from St. Patrick's church down to the school room below, where services will be held until the improvements have been completed, they will put in a new steel ceiling and do other needed repairs. The new organ is expected to arrive soon.

The Paulist Fathers are about to establish a new parish in Austin, Texas. They also propose making Austin the headquarters for their non-Catholic missions in Texas, and will have spiritual care of the students attending the State University.

John D. Rockefeller has given \$60,000 to St. Thomas college, St. Paul, Minn. to be applied to the building of a dormitory for the college. This is one of the foremost Catholic colleges in the country, but has been hampered by lack of funds. This donation will serve all its present needs.

The eighteenth annual pilgrimage to the Shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre from the Diocese of Kingston will take place this year on the 7th of July. It will be under the patronage of His Grace the Most Rev. C. H. Gantner, D. D., archbishop of Kingston.

Contracts have been let for the building of the beautiful Denver Cathedral. They call for completion on or before Jan. 1, 1910. Indiana blue Bedford limestone will be used in the construction of the building. The committee desired to use Colorado stone, owing to the large amount of building going on in the state during the past year the Colorado quarries turning out desirable stone were unable to supply the Cathedral job, and after considerable investigation the Bedford stone from the Hoosier quarry was selected.

GENERAL CHURCH NOTES.
"Gipsy" Smith, the world-famous revivalist, has been secured for a series of fall revivals at Cleveland. The German Lutheran of the Missouri synod have decided to retain

German as the official language of the church.

Protestants of all denominations at Boston have united for a great missionary exhibition next summer, to be coincident with the one in London.

The Episcopal United Board of Missions of Great Britain will organize the two boards as a central board of missions to make the work more effective.

Four colored evangelists from this country, who went to England, have struck hard times and are to be deported because they have become public charges.

After fifty years in the ministry, the Rev. James Ray, of the Church of the Epiphany, at Niagara Falls, has been obliged to relinquish his labors because of ill-health.

The anti-European feeling in India led to the serious shooting of J. H. Hickinbotham, a church missionary society worker at Kuchita, in the Nadia district of Bengal.

The memorial million guinea fund in connection with the Wesleyan church in England has been followed in the Transvaal by a million shilling fund for the same denomination.

A chained "Breches" Bible, bearing the date of 1583, has been restored to Coddington church, near Chester, England, from which congregation it was sold by the wardens in 1978.

During his fifth motor tour of England, which he is now organizing, Gen. Booth will deliver eighty addresses

and then sail away for South America to conduct a mission for the Salvation Army.

The 800 members of the men's classes in the Sunday schools of Wheeling, W. Va., are to have a meeting to which each man will be expected to bring at least one other to create greater interest in the work.
