WANING OF POWER NEW HIGH RECORD

Of Some of Heretofore Supporting Factors Noted in Yesterday's Stock Market.

New York, Nov. 18.—There was no new incident today which acted as a determining factor on the movement of prices of stocks. In its absence the market showed a waning of the influence of some of the older factors which have been active for some time past, notably since the election. Commission houses report that the volume of orders from clients in scattered localities has fallen off in the last few days. Whether from the fact that the existing demand has been filled, or the dearness of prices has lessened the attraction of stocks or suspicion has been aroused of an element of manipulation in the market which precludes a possible reaction, the decrease in the buying of stocks is obvious.

The task of supporting the market grows more difficult when the price limits are placed on buying orders. The growing difficulty of the task was manifested today with indifference shown to the striking advances in a number of stocks that have been the most influential leaders of the market sentiment for months past. The rise in Southern Pacific to above 120 established a new record for that stock and Union Pacific, St. Paul and Northern Pacific sold at the highest price of the present year. The feeling of distrust gathered force and ended in a general decline in the latter part of the day. The motive for the movement in Harriman's was supplied by the repetition of rumors of a financial plan involving a "meton cutting," details of which were vaguely presented. Northern Pacific was bought on the assumption of a deduction from the price tomorrow of the \$11.26 extra dividend, which would make the stock look cheap and would lead to some recovery of the amount of the dividend. With the reactionary tendency of prices established there grew up a discussion of the possibility of some set back in business and industry from the first pace having been too rapid. The professional element has been watching for a reaction based on technical grounds for days, and their rush to follow the movement helped materially to extend the reaction late today.

CHICAGO, NOV. 18.—WHEAT—New high record marks for all deliveries were established today in the wheat pit, December selling at 191 1/2, May 107 1/2. The market opened weak at a decline of 1/8 @ 3/8, and continued heavy the first half hour. Support from leading bulls then started urgent buying by the shorts which carried prices up with a bound. The sharp advance brought out realizing sales, which sent prices back to the opening level. The early weakness was due chiefly to the indifference of foreign grain markets to the bulge here yesterday, while the heaviness in the session was based mainly on the report that the long-existing drought in southern Argentina had been broken. The close was almost at the bottom. No. 2 red 104 1/2 @ 105; No. 3 red 104 @ 105; No. 2 hard 104 1/2 @ 105; No. 3 hard 100 @ 105; December opened 103 1/2 @ 105 1/2; highest 104 1/2; lowest 102 3/4; closing 103 3/4 @ 105 1/2; May 107 1/2.
