### ON THE BIG SEWER

Work on the big sewer is progressing as well as can be expected. The upper end has been finished excepting the short piece above Thirty-fourth street which remains to be lowered and connected; also some connections with lateral sewers. With this done, the sewer will be unobstructed all the way from Thirty-fourth street down to within a few feet of Seventh street. But house connections remain to be made very generally.

Some elaborate sheet piling work is being done in connection with the work on lower Commercial street to keep the water and mud out of the ditch, and hold the sides of the excavation in place. This will be necessary as far as Sixth street, where the old sewer, which has been giving so much trouble by its leakage, runs out. Work will progress very rapidly from Sixth street to Second street.

A large number have been engaged several days moving the big water main out of the way below Fifth street. It is being moved eastward several feet.
