PAVE 6TH STREET

BOARD OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS VOTES TO ASK FOR ESTIMATES ON WORK.

Accepts Bids For Paving Eighth and Sycamore Streets—Alderman Neff Makes Record.

The Board of Local Improvements held a meeting last night at the council chamber to act upon the bids submitted for the paving with brick of Eighth street from Ohio street to Jefferson avenue, and Sycamore street from Thirty-fourth street to the city limits which is a point opposite the entrance to the Chicago Mill yards.

The bid of L. W. Johnson of \$7,701.40 for paving Eighth street was accepted, signed up and a bond for one half the amount was approved.

The bid of Roy L. Williams for paving Sycamore street of \$41,885.07 was accepted, signed and bond approved.

Paving Sixth Street. It was stated that a number of the property owners on Sixth street had expressed a desire to pave the street with brick. Acting on this suggestion Alderman Neff moved that the city engineer furnish an estimate of the cost of this work.

The estimate on the cost of paving Sixth street will be based on a width of 36 feet from curb to curb from Levee street to Commercial avenue leaving a space of 2 feet on each side for telegraph poles, etc. For the

KAISER SPEAKS OUT TOO BOLDLY

IN SPEECH AT KOENIGSBURG REITERATED DIVINE RIGHT OF RULERS—GERMAN PRESS SCORES SPEECH.

Berlin Aug. 26.—A speech delivered last night Emperor William of Germany, before the provincial banquet at Koenigsberg, in which he reiterated and emphasized his belief in the divine mandate by which he rules, referred to the Prussian crown as bestowed by God's grace and not by parliament, nor people's assemblies, and rallied against the present movement for woman suffrage, is the political sensation of the hour here.

The leading organization's press devote much space to comment generally criticizing the emperor's utterance, and there are indications that the discourse will have a deep political effect upon the country.

Nearly all the Berlin papers are discussing the subject of November, 1908, when the publication by the London Daily Telegraph of an interview with the emperor aroused a storm against the uncontrolled public speaking of the emperor.

PROF. WILLIAM JAMES

Died of Heart Disease Last Night— Was the Dean of America's Philosophers.

Chocoma, N. H., Aug. 26.—Death, caused by heart disease, came today to Professor William James, of Harvard University, dean of America's

philosophers, at his summer home on the shores of Chocoma Lake. Prof. James had been in a critical condition since his arrival in Quebec from Europe a week ago.

This morning he took a decided turn for the worse, lapsing into unconsciousness about noon. The aged philosopher died three hours later, surrounded by his wife, daughter, son and brother, Henry James, the noted English author.
