LOST ON FLUKES

Washburn Made a Great Showing Against Nebraska.

Sawdust Field Was Too Much for Sons of Ichabod.

A blocked punt and a fumble cost Washburn her first football game of the season again "Indian" Shulte's powerful Nebraska team Saturday at Lincoln. The final score was, Nebraska 14, Washburn 0.

The Cornhuskers' sawdust field, coupled with a hot day, worked a disadvantage to Washburn, who had few substitutes to shoot in than Nebraska.

On the first kick-off, Washburn got the ball on her own 40-yard line following an exchange of punts. Coach Ream's instruction were "score in the first quarter and get the advantage." And the boys nearly did it, the backs smashing thru for three first downs to Nebraska's 15-yard line, but the necessary punch to carry the ball over wasn't there. The quarter was indisputably Washburn's, but the Cornhuskers made their first score, following a blocked Washburn punt. Quarterback Newman made the touchdown.

Nebraska made her second touchdown in the third quarter, when Stevenson, Washburn quarterback, fumbled a punt. Swanson, Husker back, recovered on Washburn's 15-yard line and Doyle and Moore carried the ball over. Captain Day kicked both goals.

Close to Nebraska Goal.

In this period Washburn forced her way to within nine yards of the Nebraska goal, Gage carrying the ball, but again lacked the needed steam to push it across.

The last quarter, like the first, was Washburn's. The Ichabods took the offensive and marched to within ten yards of the enemy's goal. Palmatier picked up a fumble and raced for the Nebraska line, but was so choked up with sawdust that his speed slackened and he was thrown from behind.

Nebraska had sixty men on the sidelines and kept rushing in fresh subs to offset the sawdust.

Victory in Disguise.

Washburn regards the Nebraska game as a victory alike, she was on the short end of the final score. But to hold the big Huskers to a 14 to 0 score is no mean accomplishment, and to be able to say that six passes, if flukes removes almost all of the sting of defeat.

Prepare for K. U.

The Ichabods came thru the game without serious injuries, altho all of them were bruised. Two sustained sprained ankles but will be in shape when the whistle blows for the Kansas game next Saturday. The team will be put thru grilling practice behind closed gates this week for the Lawrence game. Coach Ream said today:

"I never saw one man lay down at Lincoln." "They all fought every minute and are eager now to get at Kansas."

The center of the Washburn line was a stone wall, with "Rusky" Cosman, the big guard, as the outstanding star.

Washburn showed her superiority over Nebraska in the aerial game, completing three out of six passes, while the Huskers didn't connect up with one. A Shulte team never was strong on passes.
