SMALL Gas Customers in Ottawa, Kansas

--those who use gas only for cooking, lighting, water heating and some incidental house heating--paid an average of but 72 cents a thousand cubic feet for gas in February and March. Ottawa has the Three Part Rate. The old price there was 80 cents a thousand cubic feet.

Eight hundred customers, forty per cent of the total number in the city, are classed as small users of gas. Their average consumption in each month was 5,800 cubic feet. A Demand Guarantor of 37 1/2 feet or 45 feet per hour capacity was installed on each meter.
