TO VALLEY FALLS?

Expected to Win High School Meet Here Tomorrow.

Twenty-Five First District Teams Are Entered.

WASHBURN—C. OF E. CONTEST

Bearg Predicts Victory But Sees Hard Fight.

Rogers, Blue Miller, Expected to Set New Record.

The events of the dual track meet between the College of Emporia and Washburn will alternate with the events of the first district high school meet on Washburn field beginning at 1:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The Blue, hitherto somewhat weak in the dashes and hurdles, has entered two more men for these events, which should strengthen the team materially. Coach Elmer Bearg said today. Jimmie Jones has been entered in the 100-yard and 220-yard dash events and Harry Davis, a new man, in the hurdles and high jumps. This makes nineteen men on the Washburn track team, the largest in the Blue history. Bearg predicted victory over the Presbyterians, altho he admitted that the C. of E. men will make the acquisition of the palm leaf a difficult feat. Grant, basketball star and all-state halfback, is Emporia's strongest man in the dashes and quarter mile.

Scott, captain, and Jacquith, star end in football, are two more men with whom the Ichabods will have to reckon.

Rogers Out for New Record.

"Bill" Rogers, Washburn star distance runner, will try for a new record at the meet tomorrow. The present Blue half-mile record is 2:08 2-5. At the meet at Haskell recently, Rogers made 2:05, so it is a good bet that he will set a new record for Washburn tomorrow.

Valley Falls is hoped to win the high school meet in which about twenty-five teams will compete. Their star man is Stuart, who is expected to take the dashes and pole vault. Lewis, a negro, is strong in the high and broad jumps, discus, shotput and dashes, and will probably come off victorious in some of these events. Valley Falls is said to have the strongest high school track team in the state.

"Buddies" Will Be Opponents.
"Royle" Harr, of the C. of E., will compete against Ted Blevins in the shotput, javelin throw and discus. "Royle" and Ted were "buddies" in France, belonging to the same company and going thru the Argonne together.

The high schools placing first and second tomorrow will go to Manhattan for the state meet May 2. The schools which so far have been entered for the events tomorrow afternoon are: Topeka, Washburn rural, Oakland, Valley Falls, Atchison, Ozarkie, Oskaloosa, Winchester, Perry, Hoyt, Colton, Howard, Hiawatha, Sabetha, McLouth and Leavenworth. Others are expected to come in at the last minute.

Washburn Entries.
The Washburn men who will compete against C. of E. are: Gage, Kennedy and Jones; hurdles, Blevins, Vance, Shoup and Davis; middle distance, Rogers, Belden, Louthian,

Shoup, McElhenny and Kennedy; mile and two-mile runs, Rogers, Gates, Hutchison, Wolf, an Hamilton; shotput, javelin and discus, Wroff, Blevins and Kennedy; high jump, Wilcox, Vance, Crawford and Baskin; broad jump, Grove; pole vault, Crawford and Jarrell; relay, Rogers, Kennedy, Gates, Shoup, McElhenny and Louthian. The proceeds of the meet will be turned over to pay the expenses of the visiting teams. This is the first time this has been done in track. The proceeds from the elimination basketball tournament a few weeks ago, totaling \$200, were divided in this way. The Washburn field is in excellent condition for the meet.

TURK GRAND VIZIER ARRESTED

Alles Take Drastic Steps to Put Down Revolt in Ottoman Empire.

Constantinople, April 22.—Izzet Pasha, former Turkish grand vizier, has been placed under arrest by the government here. Gen. Alim Fasha and several other prominent Turks were also apprehended.

Izzet Pasha is one of the best known figures in Turkish politics and was early in March asked to form a cabinet, when the government of Sait Pasha gave notice it intended to resign. He was one of the Turkish delegates named to go to Paris to receive the terms of peace from the allies.

Twelve hundred adherents of Mustapha Kemal are reported to have been arrested and many are being thrown into jail daily. Officers of one entire section of the war office are reported to have deserted their desks and gone to Anatolia.

Government troops and forces under command of Mustapha Kemal have clashed in a number of skirmishes in western Anatolia, and it is reported the latter hold the dominant position there due to the fact they have the sympathy of the population. Suburban trains within an hour of Constantinople have been fired upon by snipers.

Anatolia has formed an independent government under the presidency of Mustapha Kemal, leader of Turkish nationalist forces in Asia Minor, according to a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company, filed at Constantinople on Wednesday.

MIDGET MARVEL MILL HERE.

W. J. Rickenbacher to Install 50-Barrel Plant in Topeka.

A Midget Marvel flour mill is to be installed at Gordon and Taylor streets by W. J. Rickenbacher. The plant has a capacity of fifty barrels per day guaranteed by the Anglo-American Mill company, which manufactures the little mills.

No other milling system is like it. It converts wheat into flour in fifteen seconds. The product is natural wheat flour, unbleached and retains the natural flavor. The plant is a recent invention. There are about 2,900 now in use.

Rickenbacher will market the product under the national advertised brand, "Flaxo." In order to secure the right of using the trade name mills must send samples of their flour to the factory laboratories each month or order that the standard may be kept up.

ARE HEARING DRY ARGUMENTS.

Supreme Bench Begins Consideration of Prohibition Cases.

Washington, April 22.—The supreme court today began consideration of whether federal constitutional amendments must be submitted to the voters for ratification in states having referendum provisions in their constitutions.

The question is involved in appeals from Ohio supreme court decrees sustaining the state constitutional referendum amendment and dismissing injunction proceedings brought to enjoin submission of a prohibition and woman suffrage amendments to popular vote.

The case is the first of its kind to reach the supreme court and upon the court's opinion it is asserted would likely depend whether the women of the country would be able to vote at the forthcoming presidential election.

PREDICTS DRY BRITISH ISLES.

"Pussyfoot" Johnson Declares England Cannot Now Compete With U. S.

New York, April 22.—A "dry" British Isles in ten years was predicted today by William "Pussyfoot" Johnson, prohibition leader, who returned from his dry campaign in Europe on the steamer New York.

Johnson declared England would have to adopt prohibition to compete successfully with the United States on an economic basis. Johnson hinted the loss of his right eye, which was knocked out by London youths who took exception to his prohibition propaganda.

C. OF C. MEMBERSHIP GROWING.

Campaign Adds More than 100 to Chamber's Roll.

The membership campaign of the Chamber of Commerce is proving successful. Guy C. Sickler, convention secretary announced today.

The campaign has been in effect since February 17. Since that time more than 100 new members have been added to the roll. R. C. Ellis, by securing ten new members, heads the list of those working to increase the membership of the Chamber. G. L. Bybee and Elmer F. Strain each have secured eight members.

TO LET R. I. WOMEN VOTE.

State Is First to Pass Enabling Act Putting Suffrage in Effect.

Providence, April 22.—Governor Beckman yesterday signed the enabling act passed by the general assembly providing the machinery for participation of women in state elections as soon as the federal constitutional amendment is ratified by the necessary 24 states.

Suffragists here claim Rhode Island is the first state to enact such an enabling measure.

BAPTISTS GIVE A BANQUET.

Preliminary of Interchurch Movement in Topeka Tonight.

The First Baptist church of this city will entertain a hundred of its members at a banquet at the church tonight in preparation for the opening of the Interchurch World movement which will begin Sunday. The guests will be teams of ten men each chosen to lead in the Baptist campaign for \$60,000 quota for the church in the movement. Other organized Baptist churches of the state will hold similar banquets tonight.
