**IN OPEN BREAK**

Johnson-Wood Scrap in Jersey Called Significant.  
Row Had Its Start at Dakota Primary in March.

**MAY ELIMINATE THE TWO**

Wood Has Violated "Favorite Son" Rule in Campaign.

Hoover, Harding and Lowden Jockeying for the Rail.

New York, April 28.—Politicians were speculating today on the possible far-reaching effects of Senator Hiram D. Johnson's charges of fraud in Tuesday's primary in New Jersey, which has resulted in demand for a recount in several districts.

This was the first open break between Republican presidential candidates in the pre-convention campaign. It marked the culmination of a growing enmity between the organizations of Senator Johnson and Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood which had its inception in the Dakota primaries in March and nearly reached a similar crisis in the Minnesota preferential vote. On the face of returns, Wood won in New Jersey by about 1,000. Politicians saw in Johnson's charges the elimination of a possible compromise between the general and the unanimous California senator at the Chicago convention.

Wood has shown an utter disregard

for the unwritten law of politics that accords to a "favorite son" the uncontested right to support of his home state. He has been more or less successful in splitting the delegations of Governor Lowden in Illinois, Senator Harding in Ohio and Governor Coolidge in Massachusetts. But in so doing, political observers assert, he has incurred the displeasure of these candidates' followers and has probably killed any chance of receiving their support in case their respective choice is eliminated in the convention.

It has so happened that most of the spectacular fights to date have been furnished by Wood and Johnson. The Dakotas, Minnesota, Michigan, Montana, Nebraska and New Jersey have seen them pitted against each other in bitter primary battles.

Hoover Plays the Game. Certain politicians profess to see significance in the fact that Lowden, Harding and Hoover have personally issued absolute mandates that their followers must make no attack on any rival candidate. In so doing they have obviously left the way open for any compromise that may be made on the floor of the convention.

The Democratic campaign has been particularly free from any bitterness other than a few factional disputes in isolated communities that will have no bearing on the general situation.

**SUNFLOWER MINSTRELS LIKED.**

**HOLD MUCH WHEAT IN STATE.**

Kansas Farmers Have 21,934,000 Bushels of 1919 Crop.

Kansas farmers are holding 21,934,000 bushels of the 1919 wheat crop, according to information gathered by J. C. Mohler, secretary of the state board of agriculture. In April last year, there were but six million bushels of wheat in hands of Kansas producers.

Car shortage is responsible for present conditions. The grain unmarketed represents 15.4 per cent of last year's yield. In northwestern counties growers are holding practically 20 per cent of the 1919 production.

**ONE DAY TIE-UP**

Paris and All France at Standstill May Day.

Government Fears Longer Siege—Makes Preparations.

Paris, April 30.—While Paris and all France today apparently faced a serious labor tieup tomorrow, May day, there had been no indications the strike would resume a revolutionary or violent character.

The demonstration, called by the federation of labor, was part of the general movement by European labor and Socialists to enforce their demands, including nationalization of industry.

The government was taking adequate measures to maintain order, put down possible violence and insure continuation of indispensable public services.

Unions voting a full 24-hour strike included restaurant and hotel workers, transportation, water, gas, electrical, theatrical, building trades, mines, postal, telegraph and telephone, metal, chemical, agricultural, commercial, banking, dockers, port and printing workers, as well as many lesser crafts.

No newspapers will be published after 6 p. m. today as all mechanical workers have announced their intention to join the walkout.

Besides this 24-hour strike, railroad workers will inaugurate a general strike to be continued until called off. As a result of this movement, the government was prepared to take over food supplies, rationing the country.

**RECOMMENDATIONS ARE MADE.**

Think Teachers' Legislative Committee Should Work for Two Years.

Committees representing the council of administration and the educational council of the Kansas State Teachers' association met in Topeka Thursday and suggested important changes in the constitution of the council. Among the recommendations made were that the council add a department of class room teachers, that each department in the council of administration be represented in the educational council and that the legislative committee be elected for two years instead of for one to give members who outline a legislative program opportunity to work for its adoption during the legislature.

Among those present at the committee meetings Thursday were: Miss Emma Hyde, Emporia; Miss Harriet Daniels, Wichita; R. M. Crum, Wichita, for the educational council; C. E. St. John, Arkansas City; Homer P. Shepherd, Kansas City, Kan.; A. E. Lunceford, Florence, for the council of administration; J. O. Hall, president of the association's board of directors.

The recommendations were to go to the directors of the association, meeting at Lawrence today.

**SAYS CHEAP TREES ARE CULLS.**

Secretary Whitney Warns Public Against Peddlers in Topeka.

Secretary Whitney, of the Kansas State Horticultural society, has received complaints that there are parties peddling fruit trees about town at low prices.

"It warns the public against accepting such nursery stock as it is undoubtedly taken from the dumping grounds of the nurserymen, and is being taken without permission of the owners," Whitney says. "The trees are culms and have been selected for cause, and are of no practical value. Parties selling these trees are subjecting themselves to prosecution under the provisions of the Kansas Entomological commission, which requires that all nursery stock sold, or offered for sale, must have attached an inspection tag showing by whose authority the stock is being placed upon the market. Parties buying nursery stock cannot afford to buy of any other than a certified dealer or reliable nurseryman. Parties selling nursery stock without proper inspection tags are warned to desist from such unlawful practices."


