### The Screen Law.

Mine operators in Kansas have been imposing for years upon the miners employed by them in digging coal. They have placed a screen at the mouth of the shaft, over which the coal has to pass before being weighed. The miner would be paid for the amount that passed over the screen; for all that dropped through he got no pay whatever. The widths of the screen varied widely, and as they became old and dilapidated more and more coal would pass through; thus a great injustice was being constantly perpetrated upon the miner, as he was being paid for only a portion of his work, and the system was profitable to strikers, bad feeling and trouble.

The legislature of 1883 passed a law declaring that the coal should be weighed before it passed over the screen and that the labor should be paid on the basis of the weight of the coal as it came from the mine.

Judge West, of the Board of County District, declared this law unconstitutional in 1884, and there has been no attempt to enforce it until the present administration came into power, and now the miners are reaping the benefit of the earnest enterprise of populist officials to protect them in their just rights.
