To whom it may concern: Whereas, application has been made, by petition, to the board of county commissioners of Trego county, Kansas, for locating a public road as follows, to-wit:

The place of beginning of said road to be at the southwest corner of section five in township twelve, range twenty-five, thence south five miles on section line to the southwest corner of section thirty-two, in township twelve, range twenty-five, and there terminating.

And whereas, Geo. T. Hargett, J. C. Martin and T. Courtney, road viewers of said county, have been appointed and ordered by said county commissioners to view, survey and locate said road;

Therefore, you are hereby notified that said viewers will proceed on the 11th day of May, 1885, at 10 o'clock a. m., at the place of beginning of said road, to view, survey, and locate said road, and perform whatsoever other duties as are required of them by law. And unless you file a written application for damages sustained, and compensation claimed, with said viewers, giving a description of the premises on which you claim such damages or compensation, your application for and recovery of the same will be forever barred.
