### HEARS FROM SOLDIER AFTER THREE YEARS

Miss Mary Sealey Who Sent Letter In Package During War Hears From Recipient

Miss Mary Sealey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Sealey of this city, received a letter January 1st, from a Captain of the Cavalry in the Czecho-Slovak army, who, after three years wrote to thank her for the message inclosed in a Red Cross package sent from Liberal.

The letter to Miss Sealey was in the Czecho-Slovak language and she was unable to read it until it was translated. W. B. King of the local American Legion sent the letter to the Red Cross headquarters in Saint Louis, for Miss Sealey, where it was translated into English. We print the translation here.
