**CROPS LOOK GOOD  
IN BACA COUNTY**

E. D. Cooper returned the first of the week from a business trip in the farming sections of eastern Colorado and western Kansas. Mr. Cooper has for several years been in charge of the John W. Baughman lands and states that this spring there is more land going into cultivation in the western country than has been put into cultivation for more than five years and that he has contracted for several thousand acres of breaking on the Baughman lands on the crop plan, the farmers seeming anxious to handle the lands on this basis. While heretofore it was practically impossible to get the breaking done on a cash basis.

Mr. Cooper also states that he finds the farmers over the country in good humor over the crop prospects and price out look and that contrary to the farmers strike, suggested last spring by some, they are putting forth a stronger and better directed effort than for several years past and even when the government had guaranteed the price of wheat at \$2 per bushel there was not the effort being made to put out the wheat acreage that will be sown this fall.

Another thing Mr. Cooper mentioned is quite in evidence, is that the wheat crop in the vicinity of Liberal excels any wheat which he saw growing over the so called great wheat producing section in the state of Kansas and that it is evident none of the yields will equal the yields from the Liberal territory this year.
