The citizens of Forgan, Oklahoma voted \$25,000 school building bonds last week and will begin work at once on a new building there. The old building which was built in the summer of 1913, has been condemned by the school authorities and the school since, the consolidation, has outgrown the old building. The second floor of the old building will probably be taken off and added to the west side of the present building.
