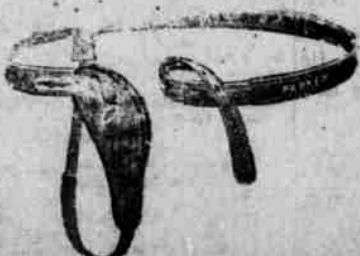

A GREAT ALLIANCE.

Before the circus acts proper begin a spectacle called Panama or the Portals of the Sea will be presented. This production involves more than a thousand people, and is the most massive, magnificent and extravagant display of spectacular invention ever seen under canvas. Will be here Sept. 25th.
