

FOR DAIRYMEN.

State Agricultural College to Hold an Institute. Will be a Meeting of Interest to Every Kansas Farmer. BUTTER MEN CONTEST Cream and Milk Will Be Scored and Prizes Given. A Poultry Exhibit Will Also Be Held in Connection.

Manhattan, Kan., Dec. 10.—From December 28 to January 2, inclusive, there will be held a State Farmers' institute at the Kansas State Agricultural college. At this time there will be meetings of interest to all dairymen and creamerymen of Kansas.

During this institute the dairy department of the Kansas State Agricultural college will hold, in connection with the scoring contest for creamery buttermakers, a contest for farm dairy buttermakers, one for cream to be scored and graded from a creamery standpoint, and one each for market milk and market cream.

Also to each contestant whose butter, cream or milk scores 90 points out of a total of 100 or better, will be given a diploma stating the score and signed by the judge and the head of the dairy department of the college.

Mr. J. C. Winkler, who will score the creamery butter exhibited, will also score the dairy butter, and grade the cream. Arrangements are being made to secure the services of an expert from the United States department of agriculture to score the market milk and cream.

Farm Dairy Butter. Dairy butter made from the milk from one herd of cattle, and made at the place where the milk is produced.

The points taken into consideration in scoring butter are as follows: Flavor, 45; body, 25; color, 45; salt, 10; package, 5.

Grading of Cream. The cream to be graded from a creamery standpoint shall be in from 2 to 10 gallon cans and shall be shipped by prepaid express to the dairy department of the Kansas State Agricultural college on December 24, 1908.

First grade—Cream which, according to the Babcock test, contains 20 per cent fat or more and which contains 2 of 1 per cent of acid or less as shown by the alkali test.

Second grade—Cream testing between 35 per cent and 39 per cent of fat and containing between 2 and 3 of 1 per cent of acid, and that is reasonably clean and sweet.

Scoring of Milk and Cream will be done on the basis of score cards, in the following manner: Market milk must have a flavor of 40 points to be perfect.
