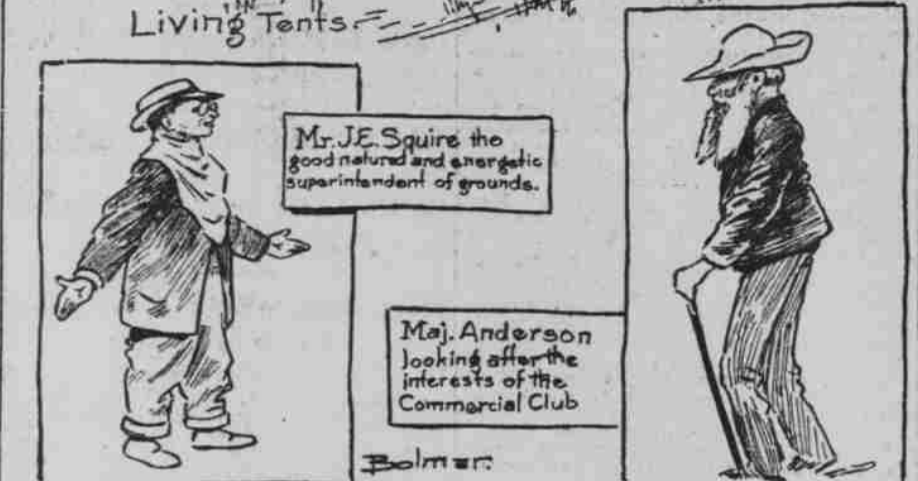
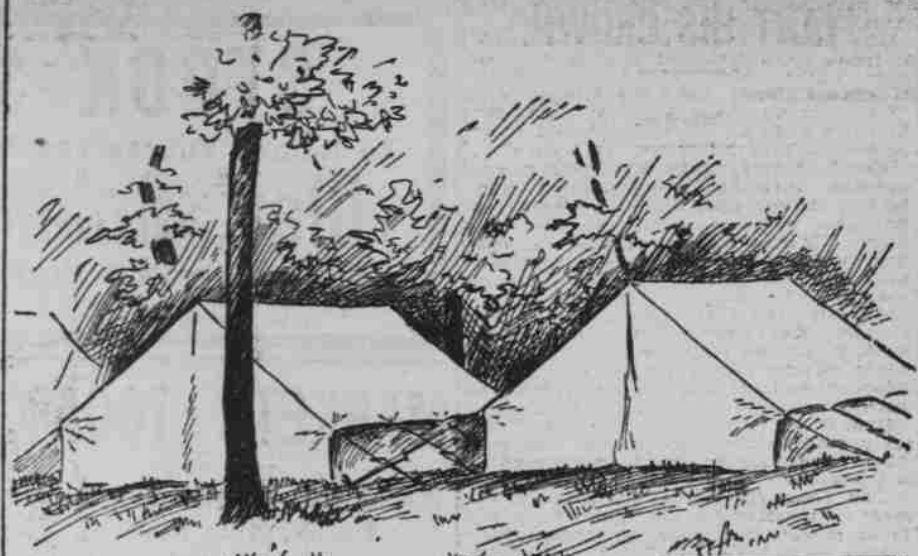


NOT A FLAG THERE
