New York, July 29.—Coney Island was visited by a disastrous fire early Sunday and seven blocks in the amusement zone were destroyed. The loss is estimated by the showmen at more than \$1,000,000. Tilyou's steeplechase park and nearly a score of small hotels were wiped out, and for a time the flames threatened destruction to the park and Dreamland, great homes of summer amusement, and the scores of smaller places which fringe the water's edge for a mile. A lucky shift of the wind to seaward aided the firemen and probably saved the whole picturesque area.
