Methodist Leader of Independence District Worried.

TOO MANY CARELESS.

Members Fail to Turn Out Even on Pretty Days.

It Cost \$65,000 and 28 Pastors to Convert 282 Souls.

Independence, Kan., June 7.—Rev. C. S. Nusbaum, presiding elder of the Independence district of the Methodist church, whose sermon recently furnished some additional data gleaned from the reports of the district last year.

On a lovely Sunday morning at one quarterly meeting at one appointment, with 152 members enrolled, 57 Methodists were present. Another church with 150 members had only 63 present; another with 585 members, 135 were present; again at another, out of 40 members 20 were at church.

Rev. Mr. Nusbaum is making a plea throughout his district for the pastors to look up those who become careless and reckless regarding their church vows.

Brewery Receiver Whitcomb Takes Possession of Property.

Arkansas City, Kan., June 7.—Geo. H. Whitcomb of Topeka, a receiver appointed by the state supreme court in the injunction suits against the brewery, arrived in Arkansas City Thursday. He soon had charge of the building at 217 South Summit street. This building is the property of the Val Blatz Brewing company.

The receiver also started an investigation into the ownership of two other buildings. One is in the name of E. J. Becker and is believed to be the property of a brewing company.
