E. L. DALE COMMITS SUICIDE

Shot Himself Through the Heart Early Yesterday Morn. - In a Rear Room of his Home - Probably Insane

A tragic end to the domestic troubles of the Dale family came at 3 o'clock yesterday morning when Livian Dale shot himself through the heart at his home at 578 north Washington avenue.

The story of the events leading up to the suicide is a long one. It was some time last year that domestic troubles resulted in the separation of Mr. and Mrs. Dale and he was placed under a peace bond to stay away from the house and not worry her nor try to collect the rent of the house they owned next to their home.

A divorce suit was begun by Mrs. Dale and dragged slowly through the courts. Mr. Dale left town and was absent a long time but returned recently and negotiations were made by his attorneys to settle the trouble.

Mr. Dale is quite ill, being confined to his bed, and Dale was urged to remain away because his presence worried his wife and made her condition worse. He was removed from the house by an officer and taken down town, but on his promise to remain away and sleep at a hotel, he was turned loose.
